PLAN MODEL TOWN.

New Village Will Be Situated on Lake Timiskaming.

On Lake Timiskaming there is growing up a village that may become within a few years a place of pilgrimage for those social reformers who have come to realize the deplorable results that follow uncontrolled development in the earlier stages of urban life, and may rival in picturesque those delightful villages perched on the hillside of continental lakes and bays that remain among the pleasantest memories of foreign travel. A large industrial concern that had decided to establish a plant near Lake Timiskaming for the production of pulp decided also that it would be good business to provide for the comfortable housing of its employees so that home life should be possible as well as work.

Skilled advisers were therefore called in, and on a site covering about a square mile on a hillside overlooking the lake a new town, Kipawa, has been planned as a social unit, with a civic centre for the chief public buildings to which the main roads converge; a village green that will be the focus of the recreation life of the community, and a far-sighted scheme of arboreal treatment. Town-planner, surveyors, architects, and engineers have co-operated in the project, and by skilful arrangements have laid out the streets with grades, for the most part, at less than five per cent., where a more rigid plan of rectangular character would have necessitated grades of not less than eighteen per cent. The workmen's houses will mostly be semi-detached with a few groups of three to six, and in all cases will provide gardens and extensive views over the lake. Attention to home beauty will be encouraged from the outset, and the rights of the community to protect the town from unlicensed ugliness and land speculation will be recognized, as they can so easily be, by the consent of the community. Plans are being shaped whereby the workmen can acquire their homes by easy payments, and the domestic exile that so often accompanies forest labor may be abolished.

BROOKE COUNCIL.

Inwood, June 28th, 1919. Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.

Minutes of former meeting read and adopted.

Mr. Mitton asked to have the sidewalk extended on the west side of Park st., also a crossing.

Sutton—Atkin—that building the sidewalk and crossing be referred to the Commissioner of the division to deal with.—Carried.

Sutton—Campbell—that Council open as a Court of Revision on Street Lighting bylaw with Reeve in the chair.—Carried. Declarations taken before Clerk.

Agreement presented by the Inwood Electric Light Company stipulating the terms on which the said Company will furnish lights for the streets of the village of Inwood as defined in by-law No. 11.

Loosemore—Atkin—that agreement be accepted and that the assessment as made in the by-law be confirmed, and that by-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Trustees of School Section No. 23 asked that the sum of \$202.47 be advanced for school purposes.

Atkin—Sutton—that amount asked for be advanced and 6% per annum be charged until taxes are collected.—Carried.

Campbell—Loosemore—that on the reports of Sheep Inspector Chas. Gray be paid \$42 for one sheep killed and Duncan Campbell \$40 for four lambs killed by dogs.—Carried.

Petition received signed by Robt. Bryce and seven others asking to have the 14th Con. and Kelly drains cleaned out.

Atkin—Sutton—that petition be received and A. S. Code, O. L. S., be requested to make an examination and submit a report, etc., so that the work might be proceeded with.—Carried.

Dr. E. C. Oxford, of Alvinston, rendered a bill for \$13.54 for repairs to his car, broken on the Brooke and Mossa Townline.

Brooke Municipal Telephone System asked that \$659.36 be advanced for telephone purposes. Granted on motion of Campbell—Atkins.

Sutton—Loosemore—that \$100 be advanced to Treasurer of the Memorial Committee.—Carried.

Sutton—Campbell—that Cowan, Towers & Cowan be paid \$186.75 being cost of defence and disbursements Lehrbass vs Brooke and the same be charged to the drainage area as per order of the Drainage Referee.—Carried.

Sutton—Campbell—that Council do now adjourn to meet in Alvinston, on Saturday the 26th day of

July, 1919.—Carried.
