HOWARD COUNCIL

The municipal council of the town-
ship of Howard, met at the township
hall, Saturday, April 1st, 1905, as per
adjournment.

All members present.
Minutes of previous meeting read and
confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS.
From J. J. Sinclair, owner of the w. 1/2
lot 13, con. 2, stating that he had asked
several times to have the drain on 12
and 13 sideroad repaired, but as the M.
C. R. has not done so please notify
them to have same repaired at once.

From the Muskoka free hospital for
consumptives, wishing contribution for
same.

From the Clerk, city of Toronto,
wishing the co-operation of this council
to pass the necessary amendments to
the Municipal Act to confer upon
married women who hold property, the
same privilege of voting as is accorded
to widows and unmarried women.

From K. W. McKay, Clerk county of
Elgin, asking this council to appoint
one or more representatives to join
with them in the formation of a deputa-
tion to wait upon the government to
urge the amendment of the Municipal
Act so that municipal corporations will
not be civilly responsible for damages
in respect to obstacles or obstructions
left upon the public highways.

From the Good Roads Machine Co.,
Hamilton, quoting prices for machinery.

From Geo. M. Baird, Clerk of Har-
wich; Arthur Smith, Clerk of Dresden,
and Henry Osbourne, Clerk of Zoro,
acknowledging communication re
amendment to the Municipal Act.

From Mac. McLean, assessor, stating
that he has now completed his roll, but
not returned same to clerk. Wished
council to remit part of his salary.

REPORTS.

From W. J. Challis, stating that he
had received the sum of \$4.50 as
poundage (see and fines for 1905).

From Alex. Greenway, stating that
he had received the sum of 70 cents
poundage fees.

From Hiram McLarty, Reeve, stating
that he had inspected the South Marsh
drain and found the lands badly
flooded, do not think that in its present
condition will give satisfaction, but as
he by-law for repairing is now passed
he work will have to be done in ac-
cordance therewith; also met on two
drains D. & W., but came to no agree-
ment.

From J. C. Williams, stating that the
iron bridge over the Arnold Creek is
now completed according to contract.

From W. E. Galbraith and A. D.
McDiarmid, stating that they had in-
spected the various sites for gravel
pits and consider that there is still
enough gravel left in the Jackson pit
for the present year. As to the pur-
chase of pit on Talbot Street, consider
that the offer made by Mr. Scott is the
most satisfactory.

From Hiram McLarty and A. E.
Arnold, stating that they had procured
piles for the abutment of Duffin bridge
cost of sum \$170 a. for co. one m.
\$80, also met the trustees of the
Everett cemetery in reference to pur-
chasing land for road, consideration
\$20 for same; also seen Mrs. Watson for
same purpose, she asking \$12 for
amount of land required.

asking for a grant for the lake shore
road, stating that said road was in need
of repair.

sidered it an unjust one, but would be
willing to have same settled by
arbitration.

R. Simons, in reference to charge for
dog tax on collectors roll.

H. Addeman, in reference to water on
concession 5 opposite his lot.

A. St. John, in reference to complet-
ing township portion of Milton and
Marshall drain, concession 8.

P. Shewburg, in reference to extend-
ing sewer pipe on ridge road opposite
lot 7, concession 9.

J. A. Crawford, asking to have the
township portion of Scafe drain re-
paired.

Neil Rose, in reference to petition
signed by himself and forty others,
grant for lake shore road.

RESOLUTIONS.
Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the ac-

counts be paid as read and charge to
their respective accounts.—Carried.
Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the
reports of H. McLarty on the Carnie,
Campbell, Tinline and South Marsh
drains be received.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Galbraith, that the
Clerk be instructed to notify Jenks &
Dresser that the conditions are now all
ready to proceed with the construction
of bridge across McGregor Creek, 6 and
7 side road and we wish same to be put
up with bolts instead of rivets.—
Carried.

Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the re-
port of J. C. Williams on the comple-
tion of steel bridge over Arnold Creek,
6 and 7 sideroad, be received and the
contractors, Jenks & Dresser, be paid
\$5, balance on same.—Carried.

Arnold—McDiarmid, that the treas-
urer be instructed to receive the
amount of \$4.50 returned to township
for fines from W. J. Challis, and he be
instructed to place same to credit of
general funds of township.—Carried.

Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the
commissioners on McGregor and Buller
drains be instructed to advertise sale of
same in following papers, Ridgetown
Dominion, Chatham Banner and one
Essex Centre paper.—Carried.

Galbraith—McDiarmid, that the fol-
lowing parties be appointed trustee in
executors for 1905:—Dir., No. 1, J. C.
Hogg; No. 2, Geo. Lenore; No. 3, Mr.
Dumster; No. 4, Jas. Turnbull.—
Carried.

McDiarmid—Arnold, that the Clerk
be instructed to notify the P. M. rail-
way company of the condition of their
crossing on 12 and 13 sideroad, Howard.
The earth should be made level with
track, this council will do their share to
put road in proper shape.—Carried.

Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the re-
port of A. E. Arnold and H. McLarty
on repairs on Duffin Creek bridge, also
bridge on river road at 12 and 13 side
road be received.—Carried.

Arnold—McDiarmid, that the clerk
be instructed to notify the C. P. R.
telegraph company to remove two poles
one at each end of the Duffin creek
bridge, as they interfere with the driving
of piles for the protection of the bridge.
—Carried.

Leatherdale—Arnold, that the court
of revision on the assessment roll of
1905, be held on Saturday, May 27th, at
10 o'clock in the forenoon.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Arnold, that the report
of W. E. Galbraith and A. McDiarmid
re gravel pit sites on concession 4, be
received.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Galbraith, that the
Clerk be instructed to notify the M. C.
R. R. company to have sewer crossing
their lane 12 and 13 sideroad, Howard,
lowered so that land on south side can
be properly drained.—Carried.

Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the
grainage of H. Addeman re water
living on road to the damage of his
property, be left with the Reeve to
adjust.—Carried.

Galbraith—Arnold, that the state-
ment of Alex. Greenway, poundkeeper,
be received.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Galbraith, that the
Clerk be instructed to notify Ridgetown
council that they are indebted to this
council for use of hall and fuel for last
provincial election, \$3.—Carried.

Galbraith—Arnold, that certain
parties, supposed to be from Ridgetown,
have been making a dumping ground
for years on the side of the road 12 and
13 sideroad, concession 10, of tin cans
and such nuisances as are apt to
frighten horses and do damage, and as
numerous complaints have already been
made to that effect, and whereas notice
has been given previous to this, for-
bidding any such to be placed along
side of any public highway in the town-
ship of Howard. Be it therefore re-
solved that this council notify once
more that if the offence continues the
guilty parties will be followed up and
prosecuted according to law, and that
notices be posted up to the above effect
and also Clerk be instructed to send
copy of this resolution to Ridgetown
council.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Galbraith, that a grie-
vance to water off site road flooding land
be left with A. McDiarmid to adjust
with all interested parties.—Carried.

Arnold—Leatherdale, that lot 7, con-
5, be put in 6 and 7 side road division.
—Carried.

Galbraith—McDiarmid, that the offer
of Mr. Scott for gravel pit on Talbot
street, about 7/8 of an acre for \$250, be
accepted and Reeve be instructed to
notify Mr. Scott.—Carried.

Galbraith—McDiarmid, that the peti-
tion of Neil Rose and forty others be
entertained and a special grant of \$100
be given to lake road and Neil Rose be
appointed commissioner to expend
same.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Galbraith, that the
Clerk be instructed to notify A. Mc-
Diarmid, township engineer, to have
township's portion of Campbell drain
completed at his earliest convenience.—
Carried.

McDiarmid—Galbraith, that M. Mc-
Lean, assessor, be paid \$40, being part
of salary.—Carried.

McDiarmid—Galbraith, that R.
Simons be refunded \$1 dog tax for 1904.
—Carried.

McDiarmid—Leatherdale, that in the
matter of bridge, arch or steel pipe at
river road at end of 12 and 13 side
road, that this council is satisfied to
leave this matter with the Reeve and use
their own judgment as to kind of struc-
ture to build and Reeve be instructed to
sign orders in payment of such land.—
Carried.

Galbraith—Leatherdale, that this
council adjourn to meet May 6, at the
hour of 10 a. m. for the transaction of
general business.—Carried.
