## Toronto Markets.

"CANADA FARMER" Office, August 15, 1865.

The weather for the past two weeks has been all that could be desired for the labours of the harvest field, which have commenced and progressed throughout the whole Province. The crops all over the country but few exceptions are abundant both in appearance and yield, some farmers realizing as high as 40 bushels of wheat to the acre. All other kinds of grain are productive and promising. Root crops are really excellent. New potatoes, of which there is an abundance in our market, are really very fine, and bring a good price. The business done in our street and wholesale markets for some time past, has been very light. There has been a small steady export of cattle, horses and pigs to the American market. Fruits of all kinds are offered in great abundance, but it is principally brought from the other side. The fruit crop is neither so good nor so plentiful as in former years.

**Flour**—market dull with few transactions; No. 1 superfine at \$4.40 to \$4.50; if from superior spring wheat, high ground, \$4.60 to \$4.70; extra do. at \$3.20 to \$3.25; superior extra at \$3.70 to \$3.80.

**Fall Wheat** in fair demand and steady, at \$1 to \$1.03 on the street.

**Spring Wheat**—quieter; selling on street, at 35c to \$1.03, and higher.

**Barley** nominal, at 50c to 60c per bushel.

**Pea** steady, at 55c to 60c.

**Oats** dull at 43c. to 45c.

**Corn** unchanged.

**Provisions**—improving; **Butter** good supply at 19c. to 22c. per lb. for rolls wholesale; **dairy**, in tubs, 15c to 18c per lb.

**Cheese**—more plentiful, wholesale 10½c. to 11½c. per lb., retail 14c. to 15c per lb.

**Eggs**—market steady, with fair supply; fresh 15c per dozen on the street.

**Potatoes**—scarce, but of excellent quality, with fair demand, wholesale, 70c; retail, 80c. New potatoes plentiful at 90c to \$1 per bushel.

**Beef**—in demand, but lower; prime cuts 8c to 10c per lb.; stew and corn pieces 6c to 8c per lb.

**Mutton**—fair supply and in less demand; at 8c to 12c per lb. hind quarters 12c per lb.; fore quarters 8c per lb.

**Lard**—Stock—dressed weight, 1st class \$5 to \$5.50, 2nd class \$4 to \$4.50; inferior, \$3 to \$3.50; calves plentiful, \$4 to \$7 each; fair quantity in the market; sheep, \$3.50 to \$4.00 each per car load, do. yearlings, \$3 to \$3.50; lambs, \$2 to \$3.

**Hay**—in good supply at from \$1 to \$4 per ton for now, & 1/2 acre and bigger.
