It is, of course,

confined to the Province of Quebec, where six clergymen are employed in ministering to the several congregations, and these are growing.

THE Ottawa Woman's Auxiliary held its monthly meeting on Tuesday, June 25th, in St. John's schoolhouse. The treasurer reported \$10 received for the month, and \$6.10 paid for freight on the bale sent to St. Peter's Reserve, Red River, by the Dorcas Society. Miss Green read an excellent report of the annual diocesan meeting held at Perth, which was a success in every way, and the kindness to the delegates by their sisters at Perth was gratefully acknowledged. The next meeting of the diocesan branch will be held at Ottawa. An interesting letter from Miss Paterson, in Japan, was read by Miss Baker.
