that the program does not preclude some assistance to western Canada, in view of the very serious situation that exists there?

Mr. Trudeau: When I said that we would have to make cuts in various programs I did not indicate which programs would be affected. Of course I will announce this publicly in due course. However I think we just received an example of what I said previously. If we want to make cuts everywhere except where farmers, fishermen, urban dwellers and old age pensioners are affected, it will be difficult to fight inflation; this is a perfect example of the vested interests in the opposition.

Mr. Gleave: I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. I should like to ask the Prime Minister, in his approach to the economy in this respect, to have regard for the fact that there are certain sectors which are not contributing to inflation and which at this time are actually depressed.

POLLUTION OF LAKE ERIE FROM UNITED STATES SOURCES
