H. R. H. Meets Middlesex Regiment on Way Back From Siberian Campaign.

Canadian Press Despatch. Revelstoke, B. C., Sept. 21.—En route Saturday from Field to Revelstoke the Prince of Wales inspected the honored imperial soldiers, members of the Middlesex Regiment, under Col. F. T. Brown, who were on their way from Siberia.

The Middlesex men arrived at Vancouver this week and are sailing for home from Montreal.

At Golden this morning, the prince received a hearty welcome from the citizens, conspicuous in the crowd being returned soldiers and a company of school children, who sang patriotic songs.

Earlier in the day, Mayor McKinnon presented the prince with an address from the citizens, and the prince unveiled a memorial tablet at the court house for those from this city who fell in the war.
