Six in Every 1000 Victims, Doubling

Ratio in 1895. Washington, Nov. 2.-Tuberculosis

has made alarming inroads upon the personnel of the United States navy and marine corps, in spite of the meas-

ures taken by the medical officials to check the disease. The annual report of Admiral Rixey, surgeon-general of the navy, which

was made public to-day, shows that in 1905 the number of tuberculosis cases in the service was 243, or 6.1 for every 1000 men. In 1895 the ratio was only 3.2 to every 1000. Practically all the cases are pul-
