Broken Liberal Promises.

Mr. T. Chase Casgrain, who replied, exposed the broken Liberal promise of economy, pointing out that the Liberals had increased the controllable expenditure by \$2,000,000 yearly, and in three years had increased the public debt by \$9,834,000, despite the increased revenue. That was why Mr. Fielding had to resort so frequently to borrowing money in the London market. It was no wonder that a deputation of Liberals from the Eastern Townships had waited upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier and petitioned him against increased expenditure and public debt, the burden of which was failing upon the farmer. But in the face of this Mr. Tarte went down to Levis, immediately afterwards, promised them \$30,000 and gave assurances that the graving dock would be extended. Mr. Dobell, too, made a promise that \$1,000,000 would be granted to the Quebec bridge, while Mr. Fitzpatrick went so far as to declare that the piers of the bridge would be seen before the snow had aisappeared from the surrounding hills. That was how the Government proposed to carry out its reform of economy in the future.

The Plebiscite Issue.

Dealing with the plebiscite issue, Mr. Casgrain accused the Premier of unfairness in the whole affair. As a matter of fact, out of two municipalities in the Province of Quebec, there were 700 in which no liquor was sold. He could testify that Quebec was as moral and sober as any part of the Dominion. The province had no need of prohibition as the Ministers who spoke against prohibition there declared, but Sir Wilfrid should have known that before no consented to the plebiscite. The consequence was that the Province of Quebec was now being held up to contempt as intemperate and illiterate, by the press of other provinces, because of the majority it gave against prohibition.

Senate Reform Fake.

The proposal of Senate reform was simply designed to make that body useless. It was a departure from the old Liberal platform of abolition. The Province of Quebec was unanimous in favor of an Upper House just as it is constituted at present. It would be remembered that in 1849. Sir Henri Joly led a fight in Quebec to the abolition of the Legislative Council, and that proposal was made a plank in the Liberal platform.
