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McKENNA'S FALL WAS FATAL

Young Employee of Park-Blackwell Co. Fell Down the Elevator Shaft.

ONLY LIVED FOR FIVE HOURS.

An Inquest Will Be Held at the Emergency Hospital This Afternoon.

Campbell McKenna, an employee of the Park-Blackwell Company, Baltimore-street, received a serious injury by falling into an elevator shaft, at the factory yesterday morning, that he died about five hours afterwards, in the Emergency Hospital.

McKenna was at work on the second floor of the factory, and attempted to get on the elevator, which was ascending, but he missed it and fell down the shaft, alighting in the basement, 15 feet below.

He struck his head and was rendered unconscious. Fellow-employees carried him into a store-room, and Dr. McLaughlin was summoned.

He was removed in the ambulance to the Emergency Hospital, where he was treated by Dr. McLaughlin.

He was suffering from a depressed fracture of the skull. The depression was repaired, but he continued to grow weaker.

About 4 o'clock he passed away, never regaining consciousness.

He was 20 years of age, and lived with his parents at 14 Clarence-square, near the corner of Broadview and York-street.

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Summer Time-Table Goes Into Effect To-Day—Many Changes Announced.

A SPLENDID SERVICE TO BUFFALO. A STORY BEHIND THE TRAGEDY.

Time of Trip Between Toronto and Montreal Reduced by Ninety Minutes.

The summer time table of the Grand Trunk Railway System, which has gone into effect, provides for an excellent service between Toronto and all points touched by this road.

Montreal, at present made in nine hours, is reduced by 90 minutes, the run hereafter to be made in 7 hours and 30 minutes.

A splendid service will be operated on a Buffalo, while to Muskoka there will be trains galore.

Toronto to Montreal train will leave here at 8 a.m. daily, except Sunday, arriving at its destination at 6:30 p.m.

Another will leave here at 11:30 a.m. daily, arriving at Montreal at 7 p.m., being the continuation of the solid train leaving Buffalo at 8 a.m. daily.

This latter train will be continued to Montreal via Toronto, leaving Toronto at 12:30 p.m. daily, except Sunday, and arriving at Montreal at 7 a.m.

The "Eastern Flyer" will leave here at 10:30 a.m. daily, arriving at Montreal at 7:30 a.m., this train being also a continuation of solid train leaving Toronto at 7 p.m. daily, except Sunday, and arriving at Montreal at 7:30 a.m.

The International Limited leaving here will arrive here at 4:15 p.m. instead of 4:45 as at present.

On the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo route the following trains will be run: New York train, leaving Toronto at 7:30 a.m. daily, arriving at Hamilton at 10:45 a.m. daily, and at Buffalo at 1:30 p.m. daily.

A new train, to be known as the "Muskoka Express, Buffalo Service," will leave Toronto at 11:30 a.m. daily, arriving at Muskoka at 1:30 p.m. daily.

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Young Wife in Kansas City Charged With Deliberately Killing Her Husband.

Murdered Man Said He Was Forced at Revolver Point to Wed the Girl.

Kansas City, Mo., June 3.—Mrs. Lola Price-Kennedy, the bride of a month, who has been in the County Jail since Jan. 10 last, held under indictment for murder in the first degree, for deliberately killing her husband, Philip H. Kennedy, contracting agent of the Merchants' Dispatch Transportation Company, was brought to trial in the Criminal Court here today.

The woman's father, C. W. Price, proprietor of a billiard hall, and her brothers, Albert Price, a traveling musician, who has circled the globe on a concert tour, and William Price, a young business man, will be tried later, on a charge of conspiring with Mrs. Kennedy to kill her husband.

The father and Albert Price are on bond, while William Price is in jail, his relatives' canvass for bail having proved unsuccessful.

A Most Unusual Case. The woman, who is the most unusual in local criminal history, and sensations are prompted by the fact. Both the Kennedy and Price families have lived in Kansas City for years.

The Kennedys being prominent in social and business circles, the woman's father, C. W. Price, had known Lola Price for a year in that time had paid her some attention.

In December they were married at the Court House by a local judge. Kennedy refused to live with his wife, and a month later brought suit to have the marriage annulled.

He charged that the woman's father and brother William compelled him, at the time of the wedding, to do so, and that he was married, threatening him with death if he refused.

A few days after the suit was filed, Kennedy was killed by a bullet from the "Eastern Flyer" train, which was passing through the city at the time.

During her five months' confinement in jail, Mrs. Kennedy, who is now 29 years of age, showed no remorse for her crime, and has frequently enjoyed company with her cell by her uncle, brother. Each side has worked up its case carefully, the state having secured the services of the best lawyers in the city.

Last night, for the first time since her confinement, she was visited by her father, who talked coolly of her coming trial.
