He Blamed Steunenberg for Loss of Interest in Hercules

Boise, Idaho, June 26.—Continuing the work of breaking down the story told by Harry Orchard on the stand

When he laid the foundation of the prosecution of William D. Hayward, the defense today is bringing more witnesses to contradict statements made by Orchard. So far these witnesses have testified as to the occurrences at Cripple Creek, Col., in 1903 and 1904, and in the Coeur d'Alene section of Idaho, where Orchard says he committed his first great crime by touching off one of the

Wardner in 1899, killing two men. The defense is trying to prove that Orchard was not at Wardner on the day of the explosion. The defense has been allowed to ask questions bringing out the story of the disturbances at Chipile Creek during the great strike of miners there. The state has objected to opening up this field, but the defense persisted that it had the right to go deeply into this matter of labor troubles in order that it may show what was done by the military and the provocation that was given to the striking miners. Today they will

probably go into the matter further, and show the action of the Western Federation of Miners, whose leaders, the defense claims, were always on the side of peace and consistently against disturbances and riot.

Was It Private Grudge.

While the foundation for proof of conspiracy on the part of the mine-owners to exterminate the federation, and thus eliminate an element that interfered with their working of the mines under conditions

mine-owners should dictate, makes a large part of the fabric the defense had built up so far. Orchard is never lost sight of, and witness after witness is called to show that Orchard, through all the years that intervened between

his flight from Idaho in 1895, and his return to this state in 1896, carried with him contemptibly a private grudge against Steunenberg. If a sufficient weight of evidence can be brought to show that the assassination of the former governor was merely the culmination of one man's grudge, and not the result of a conspiracy, counsel for the defense may say that the state's case must fail, for there will stand convicted out of his own mouth of this man a murder, and if we continue on the part of the detectives employed by the title-owners to destroy property and cause murder, in order to continue a state of martial law, can be to combine a state

While the defense is trying to break down Orchard by sheer weight of testimony, the state is pushing each witness to the limit.

they are as far as possible to show that they are subject to impeachment later. The large number of witnesses to be examined by the defense gives promise of a long period of rebuttal testimony.
