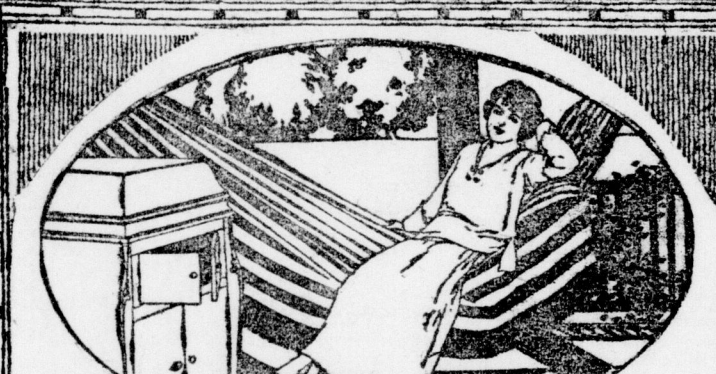

RETALIATION, SAYS MURDER SUSPECT OF STABBING COMRADE

Russian Held at Sarnia Says He Was Struck First.

CAPTURED IN PORT HURON
Swam River With Aid of Sticks to Escape Police Dragnet.

SARNIA, Aug. 16.—Chief of Police Forbes, Crown Attorney Wilson and Provincial Detective Stringer visited the scene of the Smith murder in the south end of the city this afternoon and discovered one complete pack and a half pack of playing cards, some money, blood-stained wood and other articles which will be used as exhibits at the inquest and trial.

The weeds in the vicinity of the scene of the crime had been cut and there were other evidences that the foreigner had been engaged in a card game. Alex. Zanzow, who is alleged to have stabbed Smith, in a statement to the police said that Smith struck him first and that he retaliated with a knife thrust.

When Zanzow was brought to the police station the prisoner appeared to take his arrest calmly, and proceeded to light a cigarette with his unshackled hand.

Arrested at Port Huron.
Zanzow was arrested at 4 o'clock this morning in Port Huron, after he had evaded the clasp net of the local police thrown out following the slaying of a fellow workman, Alex. Smith, a fellow workman. He crossed the river on an improvised raft, being an expert swimmer.

Upon receipt of the message from the Port Huron police, that they had captured a man talking with a description sent out, Chief of Police J. Forbes and Officers Smith and Lampel went to that city, identified the prisoner and brought him into custody, where he was thoroughly cross-examined and questioned, and was remanded for one week for trial.

The three other Russians, Sidas, Ostapenko, Steve Sepiduk and Pavel Spessa, were also remanded as witnesses, no bail being accepted.

An inquest was commenced by Coroner Logie this morning, but was adjourned until Tuesday, August 21, after the jury had viewed the remains.

The following were selected as jurors: Chas. Brown, J. E. Eddy, G. McMillan, G. Kerratt, J. Fraser, J. Hipple, A. H. Gammon, W. Lumby, W. J. Batten.

Did He Want Off Blow?
An examination of the body of Smith at the undertaker's parlors, where the body was lying in state, revealed a long cut in the forehead, the right hand, in addition to the 1/2-inch wound above the eye, which would indicate that he had attempted to ward off the blow. Smith is said to have a wife in Russia.

The slaying of Frank Smith, who was known as one of the most popular members of the foreign colony, has created an unprecedented stir in this city. Some of the older residents are unable to recall the date of a previous murder in this city, and it is estimated by some to be from twenty to fifty years since an event of this kind has occurred.

The dead man, who was 29 years of age, was known as an expert card player, and believed has been expressed that jealousy may have figured in the case.

Complicit for Police.
The police are being complimented upon the rapidity with which they took hold of the case, and approximately twenty minutes after the alarm was given, Vassel Spessa, who is said to have been one of the participants in the card game, was lodged in the cells. Posses of constables scoured the district in the vicinity where the stabbing took place for four hours, while local police officers maintained the vigil until 5 o'clock this morning.

German Officer Is Caught in Frisco; Maps in Possession

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—Lieut. Irving F. Schneider of the German navy was arrested here on a presidential warrant as a spy three days ago, department of justice officials announced today. Many maps and papers declared to be of an incriminating nature were found in his possession.

NO COIN IN PORTUGAL.
LISBON, Aug. 16.—The official journal announces that all silver and copper money will be withdrawn from circulation. It will be replaced by paper currency.

GERMANY IS GROWING WEAK AS ENTENTE'S STRENGTH INCREASES

Optimistic Outlook From the Premier of Great Britain.

U-BOATS HAVE FAILED
Loss in Tonnage Only 250,000 Monthly—1,900,000 Tons Added This Year.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—A message of hope and quiet confidence in the future was given to the British public today in the House of Commons. The people of the British Isles cannot be starved, despite the German submarine campaign, and the military situation grows more hopeful as the difficulties of the Allies will grow less and their powers increase, while the troubles of Germany will increase and her power fall away.

This is the supreme hour for patience, for courage, for endurance, for hope, for unity. Let us go through this hour with the old temper of our next year we shall begin, and the world shall begin to reap the fruits of our valor.

The stock of wheat in Great Britain has increased by one-third within a year, and this year's harvest promises well, but economy is still necessary.

German submarine shipping losses, the premier said, were exaggerated in the hope of cheering up the people of the central powers and the submarine losses in April had been 175,000 tons net each. Shipping had been speeded up and the total tonnage acquired in 1917 would reach nearly two million tons. The premier said he believed the losses would grow smaller, and that the admiralty had met with success in the submarine warfare, while measures taken by the shipping controller had permitted vessels to carry increased tonnage.

Parliament was largely attended today, it being the last business day prior to adjournment until October 16. The full membership was brought out by the announcement that Premier Lloyd George was to make an important speech on the progress of the war and the situation in general.

The premier said he agreed that the people of the central powers, because of their being told even half-truths, but they also must be told the truth, even if it was not palatable. They could exercise reasonable judgment or come to decisions regarding facts unless both the cheer and discouraging sides were presented to them.

He proposed to deal with the food situation and Germany, because of the efforts being made to create an impression of the year he had called attention to the very anxious situation of the central powers, owing largely to the energetic efforts of Lord Devonport, the former food controller, and organized by the shipping controller, the situation had improved considerably.

Increased Wheat Supply.
This time last year the wheat in this country amounted to 6,800,000 quarters, and now it is 8,000,000 quarters. The stock of both oats and barley, the premier said, was 1,900,000 quarters. There was a considerable saving in bread consumption, and owing to closer milling of wheat the country was able to add an additional 100,000 quarters per week.

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GOVT. PAID \$8 AN ACRE FOR MOST CAMP BORDEN
TORONTO, Aug. 16.—In the Borden Camp expropriation cases before Justice Caswell, judgment was rendered today. In most instances the claimants received just what the Government agent tendered them, namely, 48 an acre.

OATS READY FOR BINDER.
MUNCEY, Aug. 15.—The cutting of barley is now in full swing, and the oats are nearly all ready for the binder. Both these crops are exceptionally good, although some fields of oats have some rust. The general opinion is that this must will do little harm.

STILL HARVESTING HAY.
MUNCEY, Aug. 16.—A few farmers have been threshing their fall wheat, and it is yielding well. The average is from 30 to 40 bushels per acre. Some are drawing right to the elevator, and getting \$2.25 to \$2.50 a bushel. One took one load out which netted him \$127.

Although it is getting late for harvesting hay, some are still working in are hay fields as hard as ever. The hay is getting ripe and is of poor feeding quality.

The majority of the farmers in this district are working on their fall wheat around, preparing it for an increased acreage for 1918.

Oats are turning fast during the past few days and will be ready to cut at any time now.

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German Casualties Since War Started Exceed 4,500,000

LONDON, Aug. 15.—German casualties reported during July in the German official lists, but not necessarily having occurred in July, aggregated 89,862, as follows:

Killed or died of wounds or sickness 18,829
Prisoners or missing 12,596
Severely wounded 39,953
Wounded and slightly wounded 38,585

The total German casualties of all classes since the beginning of the war exceeds 4,500,000.

POLICE HOLD SUSPECT IN DYNAMITING CASE
MONTREAL, Aug. 16.—The police this afternoon detained a man they believe knows something of the attempt to blow up the house of Lord Atholstoun. The man, they say, is an anti-conspirator.

The police think the car was used to convey the dynamite to Lord Atholstoun's house at Cartierville.

Jos. Charbonneau, St. Andrew street, has been arrested, charged with stealing \$4,000 from the City and District Savings Bank, of which he was a teller. The police think he had been betting on the races.

LABOR EXECUTIVE FOR STOCKHOLM CONFERENCE
LONDON, Aug. 16.—Members of the executive committee of the Labor party have recommended that a resolution be adopted at the adjourned Labor party conference next Tuesday to the effect that the conference remains of the opinion that it would be desirable for the British Labor party to be represented at the Stockholm Socialist conference in order that the opinions of the party be not misunderstood nor misrepresented.

The resolution also says the conference regrets that the Government has expressed the intention of not issuing passports to the delegates to the conference at Stockholm, and directs that representation on this subject be made to the Government.

VON BERNSTORFF WILL BE AMBASSADOR TO TURKEY
BERLIN, Aug. 16.—Via London.—The appointment of Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States, as German ambassador at Constantinople is forecast. Count von Bernstorff arrived in Berlin today and has been in conference with the foreign minister.

The former ambassador at Washington is well acquainted with conditions in Turkey and the Balkans. His first diplomatic assignment was as an embassy attaché at Constantinople 30 years ago. Later he was secretary of the legation at Baghdad and has been German consul-general in Egypt.

COUNT CZERNIN BACK FROM BERLIN SESSION

Met Michaelis and Turk and Bulgarian Officials.

BERLIN, Aug. 16.—Count Czernin von Hudenitz, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, has returned to Vienna after a two days' visit to Berlin, in the course of which he had several conferences with the imperial chancellor and the foreign office. Count and Countess Czernin were the guests of Chancellor Michaelis at luncheon on Wednesday. The Turkish ambassador and the Bulgarian minister also attended. Vice-Chancellor Helfferich gave a reception in honor of Count Czernin.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.
NORTH BAY, Aug. 16.—Z. Hurtelise, a well-known farmer residing at Astorville, was instantly killed by lightning this afternoon.

300 TEACHER NAMED BLIND SCHOOL HEAD

Collegiate Principal to Supervise Brantford Institution.
