He warns her that he knows she murdered her true husband, and unless she yields to his commands, he will turn her over to the police. How Norma is extricated from this terrible situation is the crux of the story and the development is swift and surprising as it is logical. Norma Talmadge
SCORES GREAT HIT
IN HER NEW PLAY
AT THE MAJESTIC

Screen's Greatest Emotional Actress at Popular Playhouse Today and Saturday.

Norma Talmadge has never seen to greater advantage than in her latest success, "The Safety Curtain," showing at the Majestic Theatre again today and Saturday.

"Norma Talmadge has a most delightful role in 'The Safety Curtain,' one in which her emotions are allowed to run riot, and where she is all in a breath a veritable little spit-fire and a scared, submissive child. As Puck, the music hall dancer, she is exquisitely active, adorably pensive, and very much in evidence. Add to this her story (quite an interesting story) which has been finally mounted with convincing scenes of sun-baked India, and you have 'The Safety Curtain.' A fire which occurs in a theatre while the little star is performing causes some moments of intense suspense for the spectators, and other thrills are provoked by a cholera scare at an army post and by the sudden return of a brutal husband (strong man of a vaudeville act) who was thought and hoped to be dead. The story itself is a very simple one and offers nothing new, but the happy selection of unique and human characters to enact the drama gives it a twist which will find appreciation among the film fans. In the first reels the scenes behind the stage of a music hall offer color and contrast to the later scenes of society at an English army post. The acting is especially pleasing and harmonious, and some are noticeably lavish. The character actor F. A. Steven, who appears from first to last, and the star fits the role as if it had been moulded for her. She is full of fire and spirit and, above all, is perfectly natural—a dear little figure whom one watches with the keenest interest and enjoyment. Needless to say that Miss Talmadge's admirers will be delighted with her. Eugene O'Brien is again Miss Talmadge's leading man, and, as always, he is the perfect lover, the ideal husband and, above all, the very likable man. Anders Randolph portrays a peculiarly unpleasant type of villain and Gladys James rounds out the well-chosen cast by a bit which is satisfactory. This is the type of picture which almost anyone could enjoy. It has plenty of appeal for the majority of the audience and is adapted with an intelligence which will be appreciated by the critical.

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HENSALL MEN FALL.
HENSALL, Sept. 5.—Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Dilling in the loss of their son, a cable having been received informing them of the death from wounds of Pte. Cecil Dilling.

W. M. Harburn this week received a letter from his son, Pte. George Harburn, who is in France, confirming the cable his parents had received of his wounds and burns in a recent battle.

The following appeared in the Standard of Vermilion, Alberta, referring to the death of Geo. P. Welsh, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Welsh of this village:

"Official confirmation of the death in action on November 10, 1917, in France, has been received here by members of the family of Sergeant. P. Welsh, M.M. George was one of the town's most popular and best known young businessmen, and at the time of enlisting was conducting a hardware business under the firm name of McKelvey & Welsh. On the formation of a company of the 151st at Vermilion he joined up. He soon received promotion, proving a capable and able soldier. On the field of battle he did invaluable work, which won him the military medal. Sergeant Welsh's home was at Hensall, Ont., where his father, Mr. Richard Welsh, was a well-known merchant and farmer. He was married to Mrs. W. J. Seed, wife of Mayor Seed, and Mrs. A. Youngblood are sisters, and John Welsh, superintendent of the municipal electric light plant, is a brother."

ENLISTED IN THE WEST.
WINGHAM, Sept. 5.—Many residents received word that their relatives have been listed as casualties. Last night Mrs. William Sneath received word that her cousin, Ernest Running, had been killed on August 3. He enlisted in a northwestern battalion. He was 25 years of age, and besides his mother is survived by several brothers and sisters.
