FARMERS JOIN TO CRUSH REDS

Combine With Manufacturers
in Educational Campaign
for National Confidence.

Chicago, Oct. 28.—Representative
farmers and manufacturers have com-
bined under the leadership of Milo H.
Campbell, chairman of the national
board of farm organizations and president
of the National Milk Producers, to
help bring the nation back to a firm
industrial basis by means of an edu-
cational campaign designed to eliminate
class suspicion and distrust.
An effort is to be made to include
labor leaders in the committee's work.
"I am working," said Mr. Campbell,
"on the selection of a committee which
is to be composed of representative
farm organization heads, representative
manufacturers and conservative labor
men. Radicalism, the I. W. W., and
its ideas, are to be fought to a finish,
and the 12,000,000 farmers of the coun-
try, I believe are actively behind such
a fight."

TWENTY-ONE PERSONS MISSING AS RESULT OF STEAMER'S LOSS

Many Victims of the Wrecked
Vessel Trapped When
Boat Sinks.

Muskegon, Mich., Oct. 29.—Twenty-
one persons were officially unaccounted
for early today, and fourteen were
known to have been alive in the
sinking yesterday of the Crosby Line
lake steamer Muskegon, which was
driven into the pier by the gale she
had battled across Lake Michigan from
Milwaukee, and foundered in pieces by
the heavy sea. The coroner and Crosby
Line officials state they believe all the
missing have perished. That they were
unable to give the names of those un-
accounted for, but thought they included
four of the crew and three passengers.
With calmer seas today officials be-
gan searching the hull of the vessel,
which sank from sight in 50 feet of
water last night. Some of the missing
it was believed, had been trapped be-
tween decks when the steamer rammed
the pier. Coastguards and anxious rela-
tives and friends spent all of last night
patrolling the wreck-struck beach wait-
ing for the sea to give up its dead, but
only six bodies had been recovered
this morning.
Federal officers were expected to ar-
rive today to investigate the accident.

SEAPLANE WITH BIG CARGO OF FOUNTAIN PENS FOR HAVANA

New York, Oct. 29.—The inaugura-
tion of an aerial freight service be-
tween New York and Cuba took place
today when a seaplane carrying \$100,-
000 worth of fountain pens, left Bath
Beach, Brooklyn, for Havana.
Stops will be made en route at At-
lantic City, Norfolk, Virginia, Washing-
ton, N. C., Charleston, S. C., Savan-
nah, Ga., Jacksonville, Miami and Key
West, Fla. At each of these cities a
gold fountain pen will be presented to
the mayor and a silver one to the
president of the local Rotary Club.
The seaplane was piloted by James
Farnham and Robert Dewitt, both mili-
tary aviators, and carried three pas-
sengers.

VATICAN RECOGNIZES REPUBLIC.

Rome, Oct. 29.—The Vatican recog-
nized the new republic of Czechoslo-
vakia, it is officially declared.

SASKATCHEWAN GOVERNMENT TO FORECLOSE AND TAKE OVER G. T. P. UNLESS INTEREST IS REFUNDED

Regina, Sask., Oct. 29.—That the Government of the Province
of Saskatchewan will foreclose and take over the lines of the
Grand Trunk-Pacific Railway unless Saskatchewan is refunded
every dollar paid in interest on the bonded indebtedness secured
under provincial guarantees is the statement of Premier Martin.
This is in answer to press reports quoting Hon. Arthur Meighen
and Hon. J. D. Reid as having said the province would still remain
liable on its bonds despite the proposed federal legislation to take
over the Grand Trunk-Pacific.

BRILLIANT FUNCTION HELD AT MONTREAL IN HONOR OF PRINCE

Ball at Windsor Hotel Best in
City's History.

Montreal, Oct. 29.—"I'm mad about
dancing," was the assurance which His
Royal Highness the Prince of Wales
gave to one of the earliest of his many
admirers at the great military ball at
the Windsor Hotel last night.
The hotel was crowded with gor-
geously gowned women and gallant
soldiers giving themselves up whole-
heartedly to the spirit of the occasion
and forgetting in the pleasure of the
dance the stress of the war years. Of
all the brilliant social events within
the memory of the present generation
none equalled tonight's ball from the
standpoint of unalloyed enjoyment,
completeness of arrangement and
spontaneity and emphatic success.

EXHIBITION OF WAR PAINTINGS IS OPENED BY PRINCE OF WALES

Montreal, Oct. 29.—An unrehearsed
and unlooked for addition to the pro-
gram of events covered by the Prince
of Wales yesterday was the opening of
the Canadian War Memorials Exhibi-
tion of paintings in the art gallery on
Sherbrooke street. It was while the
prince was at the art gallery taking
the most of the great military ball at
the Windsor Hotel last night.
The exhibition was opened by the
prince who declared his intention
of doing it and proceeded to put his
project into execution. In company
with Lieut.-Col. Parkinson, command-
ing the Canadian War Records Office
and Capt. Percy P. Godenrath, officer
in charge of the exhibition, the prince
made the round of the art gallery,
examining freely on the wall a fine
collection of war paintings, and recog-
nizing many of the officers depicted.
The exhibition will be in Montreal for
a month.

PRINCE IS TOURING EASTERN PROVINCES

Montreal, Oct. 29.—The Prince of
Wales today is touring the eastern
provinces. He will visit St. John's,
Parram, McGog and Sherbrooke. Re-
turning to Montreal this afternoon,
the prince's train will stop for a few
minutes at Lennoxville, Richmond and
St. Hyacinthe.

ANARCHISTS' PLAN IS NIPPED IN THE BUD

Discovery of Plot Follows Ar-
rests in Cleveland.

Cleveland, Oct. 29.—Discovery of a
radical plot to spread terror through-
out the nation by another series of
bomb explosions next spring, was an-
nounced by the police here today follow-
ing the arrest last night of five men
and one woman, suspected of having
planned the destruction of the central
police station.
Believing they are members of an
anarchistic circle that has been work-
ing in more than 100 cities, the police
questioned the group all night in an
effort to learn details of their plans or
the extent of their organization. One
of the men is believed by the police
to have been active in bombing Mayor
Harry L. Davis' home July last.
With the prisoners a large quantity
of high explosives, one complete bomb,
several incomplete bombs, a number of
automatic pistols, and a supply of am-
munition and much anarchistic litera-
ture was captured.
The police declared the bombs were
similar to those used in the bombing
of Mayor Davis' home. They believe
the arrests will lead to apprehension
in other cities in connection with the
country-wide bomb outrages which oc-
curred last June and July.

ATTACK ON PETROGRAD PROVES UNSUCCESSFUL

Berlin, Oct. 29.—The anti-Bolshevik
newspaper (apparently an Estonian
paper) prints a communication from
Gen. Yudenitch, dated October 27,
declaring that the attack on Petrograd
has been unsuccessful.
Reports from Reval state that Gen.
Yudenitch is falling back along the en-
tire line.

SNARLING DOG INVADERS SCHOOLROOM; 12 BITTEN

New York, Oct. 29.—A snarling stray
dog broke into a Brooklyn school-
room today and bit twelve pupils before
the police could kill it. Three hundred other
children were gathered out of the building
in safety. The head of the dog was
rushed to a laboratory, where it will be
examined for rabies.

DECLARES BRITAIN WOULD APPLY GAG TO UNITED STATES

Bishop Gallagher Fires Broad-
side at British Government.

"AFFECTS FREEDOM"
Detroit Churchman Objects to
Interference in Religious
Affairs.

New York, Oct. 28.—Bitterly attacking
the British Government for attempting
to interfere in a church matter, Right
Rev. Michael J. Gallagher, Catholic
bishop of the diocese of Detroit, in a
statement given out here today by the
Friends of Irish Freedom declared that
the protest of London to the Vatican
against ratification of the election of
Very Rev. P. E. Megennes, national
president of the Friends of Irish Free-
dom, to the head of the Carmelite Order,
is a "concrete illustration of the League
of Nations in operation."
The reason for the protest of the
English Government, said Bishop Gal-
lagher, is that the powers that be do
not like Father Megennes because he is
"a fearless and powerful advocate of
free speech and of a free press for all
creeds and a staunch champion of lib-
erty everywhere."

"This interference of the British Gov-
ernment is not of interest to Catholics
alone," he maintained. "The protest is
of equal interest to the Protestants
of America, because it vitally af-
fects the freedom of all people, par-
ticularly freedom of conscience."
The British Government should hear
from America, in no uncertain terms,
that the day has not yet dawned when
Americans of any creed are ready to
wear a muzzle labeled "Made in Eng-
land."

"Here we undoubtedly have a con-
crete illustration of the so-called League
of Nations in practical operation. We
still face the centuries-old hypocrisy
that has clouded the springs of self-
determination and held in bondage mil-
lions of human beings as 'subject na-
tions.'"
The protest against Father Megennes
is unworthy of any government in the
year 1919. Great Britain has only her-
self and her unblinking phariseism to
blame for the distrust and ill-will felt
toward her by the liberty-loving people
of all creeds in this blessed nation of
ours.

Charges Press Censorship.
"The recent war was fought to make
the world safe for democracy, and the
League of Nations was heralded as the
forerunner of universal peace; but the
net result of its operation thus far is
the continuation of a press censorship
that permits doctored news or no news
at all, concerning Europe, to reach the
rest of the world. The passport of the
press is in full operation, and freedom
of the press and freedom of speech hang
in the balance."

Now that three countries have ratified
the League of Nations and England feels
secure—America having saved her from
utter destruction as a result of the
war—she apparently forgets her prom-
ises and proceeds to furnish an object
lesson to the world of what autocracy
can do masquerading under the title of a
League of Nations.
"During the war England fed this
country with propaganda in an attempt
to convince the American people that
the question of Ireland was a religious
issue. She tried to create a religious
war in America on that issue. Now that
the war is over, however, the same Eng-
land boldly seeks to interfere in church
affairs and to exercise the veto of the
state over free speech."

TROTZKY'S FOLLOWERS CALL BOLSHIEVICK CHIEF THE DIVINE LEADER

British Officer Does Not Expect Petro-
grad to Fall This Winter.

Helsingfors, Oct. 28.—Lieut.-Col. Le-
strange Malone, a Liberal member of
the British House of Commons, has re-
turned after a daring unofficial visit to
Petrograd. He told friends here that
he was convinced, after an investiga-
tion of the political and military situa-
tion of Russia, that it is improbable
that Petrograd will fall this winter. He
said that reports of dissension among
the Bolsheviks were untrue, and that
Lenine and Trotzky appeared to be
working in entire accord.
He saw Trotzky review thousands of
soldiers, who enthusiastically hailed
him as "a divine leader."
Col. Malone said that the Bolsheviks
asserted that Gen. Denekine had lost
the confidence and support of the Al-
lies, and had reached an understand-
ing with Gen. von der Goltz and Col.
Bermond, heading the so-called West
German army, composed largely of
Germans in the Baltic provinces.
Col. Malone entered Russia from
Reval, passing through the Estonian
lines.

DENEKINE'S FORCES BADLY DEFEATED BY RUSSIAN INSURGENTS

Washington, D. C., Oct. 29.—Insur-
gent forces in the Kuban territory on
the northwest side of the Caucasian
Mountains, making common cause with
the Kuban Cossacks, have taken from
the forces of General Denekine, the
port of Novorossiysk, and occupied the
city of Stavropol, according to dis-
patches received today by the Ukrain-
ian mission.
"There is every reason to believe,"
the dispatches assert, "that in a very
short time the insurgents will clear the
whole Kuban territory of Denekine's
so-called volunteer troops."

Swiss Socialists Gain 19 Seats in Parliament

Berne, Oct. 29.—As a result of the
elections held in Switzerland the radi-
cal party loses 45 seats in the Swiss
parliament, and the Socialists have
gained 19. The new agrarian party
will hold 27 seats, while the clericals
and Conservatives will maintain their
position.
The chamber will be composed of 63
radicals, 42 clerical, 29 Socialists, 27
agrarians and 13 from scattering par-
ties.

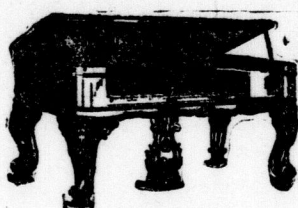

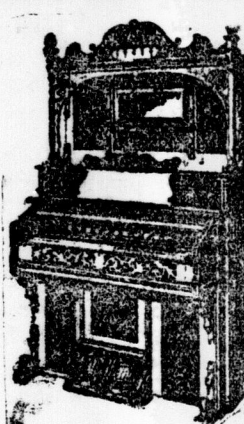

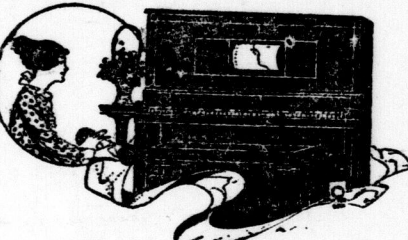

H. C. L. HITS HOBO, HE DEBATES STRIKE

Knights of Road, in Gotham
for Meeting, Find Handouts
Slim, Riding Tough.

New York, Oct. 29.—Delegates to
the annual convention of the Hoboes
League of America, who arrived here
today from the west, via "hade door
Pullmans," or "the blind," complained
bitterly against the high cost of living
which they report makes it impossible
for them to secure handouts at back-
doors of the country.
The delegates also resent the attitude of
the builders of the new style of day
coach and Pullman cars, which are de-
signed with the "heartless" purpose of
making "riding the bumpers" very un-
comfortable, if not impossible, for the
knights of the road.
These problems will be discussed
at the convention, which will be
presided over by Jeff Davis, "king of
the hoboes."
According to a threat of "One-
Legged Al," who figures in a legend
of the sand-warming house in the
Detroit yards of the Michigan Central,
the hoboes will go on a strike unless
they win concessions from the public
and from the Pullman people. Going
on a strike for the hobo, the one-
legged philosopher explained, means
being forced to go to work.
Many of the delegates agreed the coming
winter will be the toughest one they
ever have faced. Some of them even
are in favor of calling off the annual
convention "blinde" bout for New York
and dodging "bulls" along the way.
