Chicago, Oct. 28.—Representative farmers and manufacturers have combined under the leadership of Milo H. Campbell, chairman of the national board of farm organizations and president of the National Milk Producers, to combat radicalism of all kinds and to help bring the nation back to a firm industrial basis by means of ah educational campaign designed to eliminate class suspicion and distrust. cational campaign designed to eliminate class suspicion and distrust.

Vessel Trapped When Boat Sinks.

Muskegon Mich. Oct 29 -Twenty one persons were officially unaccounted Discovery of Plot Follows Arfor early today, and fourteen were known to have lost their lives in the sinking yesterday of the Crosby Line lake steamer Muskegon, which was driven into the pier by the gale she had battled across Lake Michigan from Milwaukee, and pounded to pieces by the heavy sea. The coroner and Crosby Line officials state they believe all the missing have perished. The purser was unable to give the names of those un-accounted for, but thought they included four of the crew and three passengers.
With calmer seas today officials began searching the hull of the vessel, which sank from sight in 50 feet of water last night. Some of the missing, it was believed, had been trapped between decks when the teachers are the seasons. tween decks when the steamer rammed the pier. Coastguards and anxious relatives and friends spent all of last night patrolling the wreck-strewn beach wait-ing for the sea to give up its dead, but only six bodies had been recovered

planed the destruction of the central police station.

Believing they are members of an anarchistic circle that has been working in more than 100 cities, the police questioned the group all night in an effort to learn details of their plans or the extent of their organization. One of the men is believed by the police to have been active in bombing Mayor Harry L. Davis' home July last.

With the prisoners a large quantity of high explosives, one complete bomb, several incomplete bombs, a number of automatic pistols, and a supply of ammugation and much anarchistic literature was captured.

The police declared the bombs were similar to those used in the bombing of Mayor Davis' home. They believe the arrests will lead to apprehension in other cities in connection with the country-wide bomb outrages which occurred last June and July.
