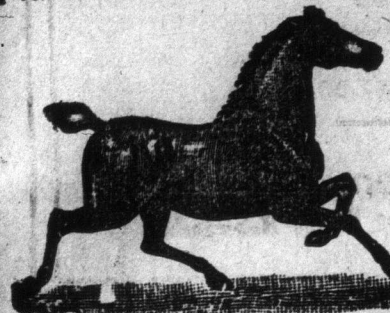
"Diamond J." Brady Died Prominent in Sports
