CANCER DEATHS ON INCREASE IN CITY

Publicity Given to New
Serum Treatment Draws
People to Toronto.

The publicity given to the new serum treatment of cancer by Dr. Glover, and the consequent attraction of sufferers to the city, is suggested as one of the causes for a slightly increased death rate in Toronto for the past month, according to the report issued by the department of public health yesterday. The general mortality for the month was 474. Based on a population of 515,000, this was 10.3 per thousand of population. For the corresponding month during the past five years the rate has been 10.2 per thousand, while the rate last August was 8.6 per thousand.

Deaths of infants under one year of age were also more numerous during August than a year ago. The total last month was 120, while that of August, 1919, was only 92, but as there was, during the same period, an in-

crease of 60 per cent. in the birth rate, the increase in the infantile death rate is not difficult to explain.

RETAIL PRICE OF SUGAR IS BELOW WHOLESALE

In Toronto, sugar is being sold by some retailers below the price asked by wholesalers, this condition being due to the fact that Canadian refiners are trying, as they naively express it, to "stabilize the market."

Local wholesalers say they are not carrying much sugar. One firm quoted a price yesterday of \$22.21 per 100 pounds, altho, in a chain of retail stores, sugar was on sale at 21c per pound.

Meanwhile, across the border, sugar is still slumping. In New York yesterday, wholesale houses were competing to get rid of their stocks at 15c per pound, with 2 per cent. off for cash.

BUILDING PERMITS ISSUED.

The following building permits were issued by the city architect's department yesterday: W. G. Connell, one dwelling, 87 Glenmore road, \$4,000; Hubberlin Bros., alter present fireproof store and factory to the office building at southeast corner of Yonge and Richmond streets, \$25,000.

ELECTRIC WORKERS SHOW IMPATIENCE

Companies Are Given Time
Limit to Signify Assent
to Award.

Full responsibility for a repetition of the street car tie-up which featured last year's Exhibition rests upon the management of the Toronto Railway Company, the Toronto Power Company, and the Toronto and Niagara Power Company, according to the statement given out yesterday by Business Agent J. T. Gunn, following a special meeting of the Electrical Workers' Union. The men decided, according to Mr. Gunn, to give the companies concerned until today to signify their assent to the award granted on August 18 by the board of conciliation which investigated the wage dispute between the men and the managements.

The award, which was accepted by the men on August 23 and which the various companies are said to have ignored so far as any action on their part is concerned, granted to

the electricians of Toronto increases of from 10 to 12 cents per hour and to the electricians of Niagara Falls an increase of five cents per hour. The award also affected the machinists in the companies' employ, and granted them an increase of 10 cents per hour and their helpers an increase of seven cents per hour.

"The men feel that the companies have had a long time to consider the award and that they have shown great patience in the matter," declared Mr. Gunn, adding that the department of labor had communicated twice with the companies regarding their intentions but had received no reply.

The men will hold a mass meeting at eight o'clock this evening, when the replies of the companies will be heard and further action decided upon. The officials of the union have been authorized to communicate with the department of labor and have it use its influence towards the averting of a situation of greatest inconvenience to the public.

MAN BREAKS SHOULDER.

While working on a scaffold at 171 Glen road yesterday morning, the structure collapsed and Thomas Shaw, aged 37, 33 Boon avenue, a carpenter, fell fifteen feet to the ground, breaking his shoulder.

BOOK BORROWING AT LIBRARY GROWS

Large Increase is Also Reported in Number of People Joining.

August is always the slack month of the year at the Toronto Public Library, because of the absence from the city of so many borrowers. The use of books is generally about one-half of what might be called an average month.

ONTARIO LEAGUE PLANS TORONTO SAFETY WEEK

The executive committee of the Ontario Safety League has approved a plan by which Toronto will be treated to a week of safety.

The week of 10th to 16th October has been designated "Safety Week," and in that week the Safety League and the various organizations co-operating plan an intensive drive against accidents.

During Toronto's Safety Week, the various committees plan to teach accident and fire prevention to every man, woman and child in a spectacular educational campaign in which various forms of publicity will be used. The public will be reached by means of posters, bulletins, bill boards, street car cards, letters, advertisements, meetings and safety shows and given a liberal education in safety.

MILK PROBE INTEREST

Producers Prepared to Support Increased Price—Board of Commerce Has Data.

Considerable local interest is being taken in the sitting of the board of commerce at the city hall tomorrow morning, when the question of milk prices will be thoroughly investigated.

E. J. Stonehouse, president and the members of the executive of the Ontario Milk Producers' Association, will be present in support of the report of the provincial government commission, which established that dairymen have been losing money selling milk at \$3.25 a gallon.

It is also stated that counsel for the board of commerce has prepared a case based on the evidence elicited before the fair price committee just a year ago. The nature of the farmers' association which supplies milk to the city of Toronto will come in for some investigation. The methods of the producers towards organization and contracts with the milk powder concerns will, it is understood, be aired quite intimately, and the board of commerce will be shown hosts of figures prepared by the local staff during the year just passed.
