IT WAS GRACEFULLY THE MAYOR PRESENTS

Honoring the Trained Nurses—
for Sick Children the Scene of
a Festive Ceremony.

On Wednesday afternoon, the 1st of September, 1894, an interesting affair took place at the Hospital for Sick Children, College street. In connection with the institution there is a training school for nurses. For two years past the methodical education in nursing has been subject to a rigid examination every part of the process. Successful candidates receive diplomas and are presented by the Mayor with elegant gold medals as tokens of their ability and as tokens of the high regard in which they are held.

It was this graduation ceremony that took place on Wednesday afternoon, the 1st of September, and a few gentlemen and ladies were present. Those present were:—Miss Mary, Superintendent; Messrs.
