## HE HAD ONLY ONE

Prisoner Incorrectly Reported as Having \$100 When Arrested, in Trouble With Creditors—He Had Only One Dollar.

Tuesday evening a man named Moore was arrested for drunkenness and lodged in the central station. When the arrest was entered on the police book it was stated that \$100 was found on the person of the prisoner. This amount of money was the cause of much trouble for the prisoner.

A reporter came up to the central station and he was evidently bothered with "Jonny Noddy," for he reported that \$100.00 had been taken from the prisoner.

The police magistrate ruling in the morning papers the starting information that a prisoner had one hundred dollars when arrested deemed it advisable to remand him until enquiries could be made concerning his case.

Judge Ritchie was not the only one who was started by the information given to the public by the sleepy reporter. Poor Moore, it seems, owed about \$10 to Mr. Brennan, the undertaker, and the latter hearing that he had an excellent chance to obtain his money, lodged an execution against the prisoner, and William Gibbons was the constable who did the work.

Moore has been in jail since yesterday morning, all on account of the mistake of the reporter who urged his creditors on action.

The mistake was rectified this morning and a friend of Moore's aided in the release of the prisoner.

Twenty-seven steamers with a tonnage of 97,157 tons arrived so far this season. The same number arrived last year, but with less tonnage, viz. 91,442 tons.

The valuation of the first twenty cargoes going forward last year was \$2,230,160 against \$1,887,288 for the year's shipments. Larger tonnage is going forward this year than ever before.

## A HOSPITAL FOR WEST END

A Couple of Rooms in Carleton City Hall May be Fitted up for Emergency Cases.

It is probable that some arrangement will be made shortly to fit up a couple of rooms in the Carleton City Hall as an emergency hospital, that could be used in case of accidents happening on the West Side after the ferry has ceased running at night.

Mayor White said this morning that he had been approached in the matter by Supt. Downie of the C. P. R., who stated that the C. P. R. would be willing to contribute if such a place was arranged.

It is pointed out that with the large number of men at work on the steamers and the fact that many cases of accident have occurred in the past, it is a matter of some importance that a place should be provided for the treatment of the injured.

The mayor is heartily in accord with the project and being a medical man can see the necessity for prompt action in such a case. He said he thought arrangements could be made with the hospital commissioners to allow one of the Public Hospital to go over there and have charge of the place, and one of the West Side physicians to be in charge of the place whenever necessary.

The mayor thinks that not only could the patients be looked after temporarily, but that in many cases they could be cared for until they were fully recovered.

It is stated that it would be good to fit up such a place and the good it might accomplish is great.
