Miss Chrystal MacMillan Arouses Public Indignation

Member of Hage Peace Convention Spoke In Toronto—Attitude Does Not Suggest Sympathy With Britain

(Toronto Daily News)

It was a stormy meeting last night when Miss Chrystal MacMillan, of Scotland, one of the women who attended the peace conference at The Hague, spoke at Victoria College.

And really, can you wonder at it being stormy?

There was a British woman taking the stand that all nations were equally responsible for the war, that all the nations, Germany included, were fighting for peace.

No account was taken of the fact that it was Germany that invaded other lands, that Germany has committed devilish acts on Belgium, without any possible excuse; that in fact, were it not for Germany there would not have been war.

Miss MacMillan's point of view was so markedly neutral, she refrained so carefully from placing blame which all the world knows belongs with Germany, that it was impossible for you not to be left with the impression that she was pro-German. Her sentiments, anyway, were not British.

It has been pretty conclusively proved that the International Peace Conference at The Hague was of German origin and in German interests. And yet a British woman who only has her British liberty now because British soldiers are fighting and preserving that liberty, calmly says that Germany is fighting for peace.

Doubtless many of the individual German soldiers are taught to believe that they are fighting for right. But the fact that they in their ignorance are misled into thinking so does not put the German side on the same level with Britain's side. Certainly we have not been misled into any wild notions.

Germany did not enter the war to uphold her promises and her honor, to defend a nation wrongfully treated, or even to defend her own land. Germany went into the war to reap advantage—to gain more territory and power.

On the other hand, not only honor, but protection of our empire forced Great Britain into a war she did not want, and was not prepared for, as we have learned to our terrible cost. And yet Miss MacMillan actually says that in judging we should remember that we have caused reports just as Germany has, intimating by her words that you may wish to take out of it.

That Peace Conference

Then, about this International Peace Conference at The Hague. It has been claimed as an excuse for their meeting that they do not mean to endeavor to use their will to bring about peace in the present war, but that in the future time, when she says that she finds in Europe three of the belligerent governments willing to take action in a peace conference when the other government will act, and that the two of them are considering calling a conference. Also that at a conference of peace societies in San Francisco it was decided that the future time should be urged to co-operate with neutrals in the hope of taking some action.

Yes, the plans of the peace conference are distinctly bearing on the present war. Their idea, according to Miss MacMillan's own words, is for the neutral nations—the United States, Spain, Italy, Norway, Sweden, and Denmark—to get together and make proposals to the present belligerents.

As though they could possibly make any proposals between Belgium and Germany, for instance, which would be accepted and would make Belgium say "All right; let's stop quarrelling and be friends." Can a nation whose policy permits the deplorable things perpetrated by Germany on Belgium be raised up to the level of honor which Belgium has, and have the same treatment meted out to them?

If one man, with no provocation, attempts to kill another, are both those men to be treated alike? Is a third party who does not care a hang so long as he saves his own skin to be allowed to say, "Murderer, give back the arm and the leg you cut off. They are dear now, but give them back anyway, and shake hands over it?"

That is about the attitude of Miss MacMillan and her Hague confederates.

Place No Responsibility

At that Hague Conference they pleasantly agreed on several little rules. One was that no responsibility for the war should be placed anywhere in their discussions. Another was that the conduct of no nation in the war should be discussed. Can you conceive of any British woman with an ounce either of humanity or patriotism being willing calmly to discuss things, leaving out the glaring truths which tell why there is war? Could any person say that in the solution of a problem facts as they exist should be ignored?

If there is a mad dog do we allow it to loose, and pass the same judgment on it as on the faithful watchdogs guarding the homes?

But forsooth our reports are censored, says Miss MacMillan, maybe the mad dog doesn't know he is mad, so why kill him?

The plans of the Peace Commission are of course that international disputes shall not be settled by war. Everything shall be settled by arbitration and conciliation. Well, it may work out in some halcyon age. After this war is terminated.

Moreover no territory is to be transferred from one government to another without the consent of the people who live there. In future no little disputes shall be settled by arbitration and conciliation, but the countries of the world will all agree to bring pressure to bear on any country going to war—a pressure that is economic, social and moral. For instance, if you please, just now Germany is complaining that Great Britain has cut off her feet from all ports of the world, and the unique little suggestion from Miss MacMillan was that if the other countries would boycott Great Britain for being so naughty, then Great Britain could be started out. It seemed an odd suggestion to come from a British woman. It seemed odd to me, considering that, an instance for reprimand—rather than that Germany should be punished in some way for sinking passenger ships, for killing women and children.

Unbelievable Opinions

It was a strange address, to hear in Canada. It was almost unbelievable that a woman for whom British soldiers are dying, whose actual safety at the present moment from things too awful to con-
