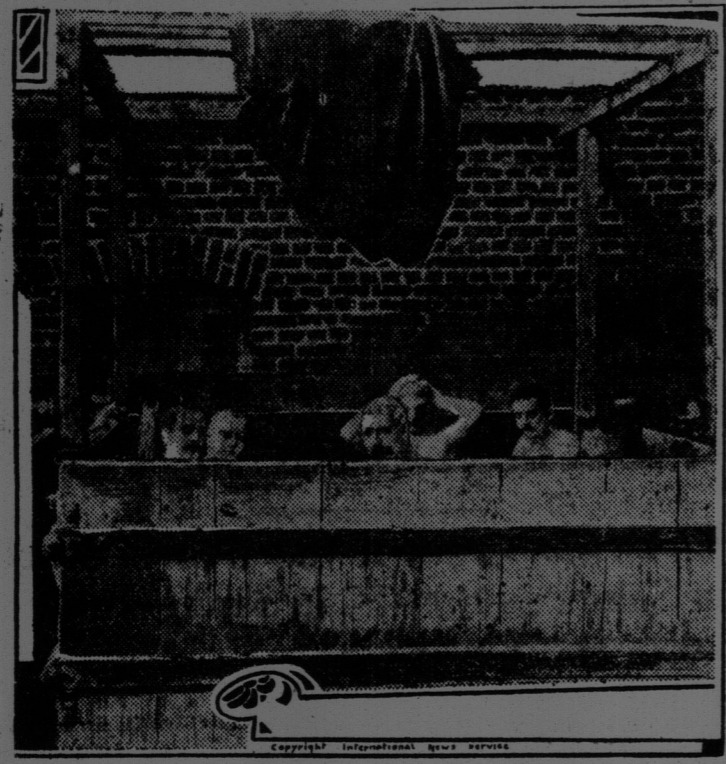


BRITISH SOLDIERS IN OPEN-AIR BATH

Table Sent to War Office in Hope That Body May be Sent Home

He was a frequent visitor to St. John, although he was a born American, his parents were born and lived for years in St. John. When the call for volunteers came he left his home in Dorchester, Mass., and came to St. John and enlisted in Major Sturdevant's company. A telegram received by Mrs. Margaret Finlay, Thorne avenue, from his people gives the information that his father has sent a cable to the War Office to try to locate the body and have it forwarded to his home.
