Hance J. Logan, M. P., Declares Country Should Have Better Trade Representation to Compete With U.S. Enterprise-Must be Change in Methods of Choosing

Turning next to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, Mr. Logan said it was trying to operate a service. The Royal Mail Steam Packet Company is subsidized, and the C. G. M. M. is sent to compete with it. We are paying a subsidy to the former of \$340,000 and losing on the latter \$240,000. There is no cold storage and the service of 12 knots an hour is not given. Yet this was promised by the Government. It is not carrying out the terms of its trade agreement with the islands. He was on a steamer that did not make more than seven and a half knots an hour. We are operating those C, G. M., M. steamers without getting enough freight for a sailboat because there is no cold storage. If we violated a treaty with a foreign country as we have the West Indies agreement it would be a casus belli.

Mr. Logan next quoted figures to show how the trade of the United States with the West Indies, both import and export, had increased enormously, and that of Canada had grown to only an insignificant extent. He referred to the banana trade which comes to Canada by way of the United States. How much longer are we going to tolerate this sort of thing? It is time that we, apart from politics, united to insist that such products come on Canadian ships to Canadian ports. The speaker dwelt on the value the traffic would be to our railways, which are now losing money. Bananas that can be bought on the islands at half a cent each cost five and six cents in Canada, because of the strangle-hold of the United Fruit Co. on the traffic. We must do something to get these tropical fruits in our own steamers and over our own railways.

Some Remedies.

Mr. Logan next referred to the action of the United States in regard to Havana, Porto Rico and the Philippines. They established free trade and developed an immense business. We should have free trade or commercial union with the West Indies, They

and get a better one. It was absurd to compete with the company through the C. G. M. M. steamers. They should go on other routes to develop new trade.


