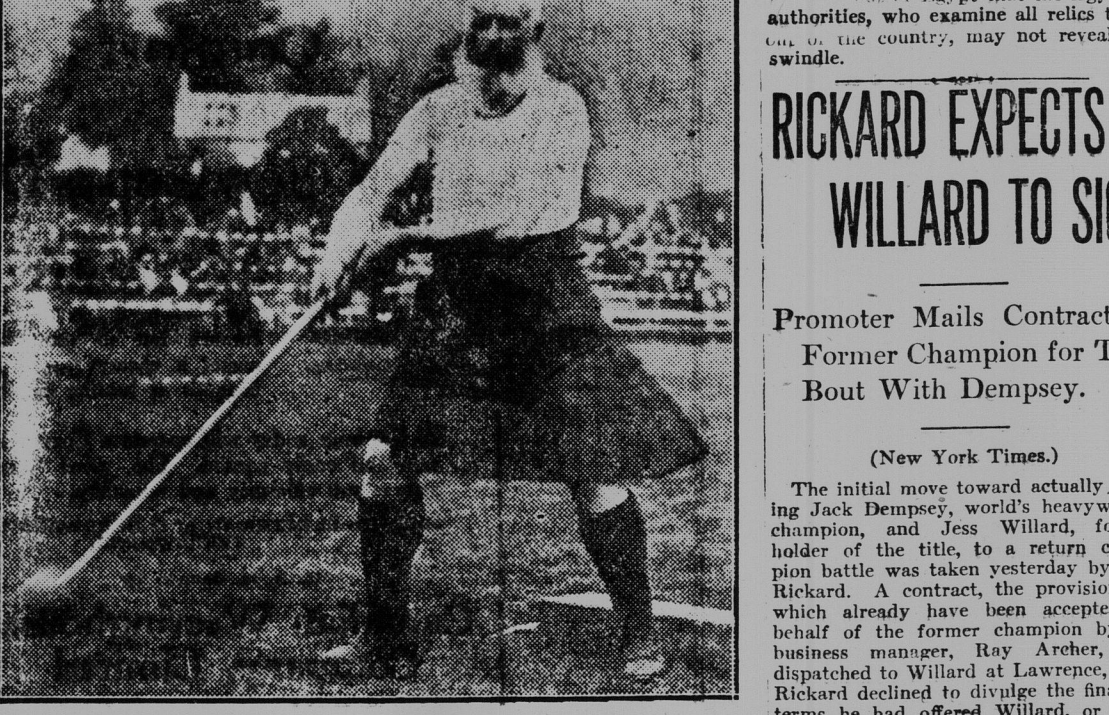

HOW IT SEEMS

TO BE HUNTED

Fugitives from Justice De-

scribe Their Sensations

While Trying to Dodge the

Police.

How does it feel to be hunted—to

know that whenever you go the long

arm of the police may reach out and

grab you?

The police from time to time have

given their impressions of the feelings

of such fugitives. It has remained for

a student of crime who has met these

fugitives in police stations and prisons

to jot down their impressions as he

heard them from their lips. Some of

these men have reformed and are lead-

ing honest and industrious lives; others

have paid the extreme penalty for their

crimes, and not a few, having under-

gone punishment, have embarked upon

a criminal life. Most of these fugi-

tives consented to talk only on condi-

tion that their names would not be

made public.

A few years ago when gangs overran

the city, a youth, during a West Side

gang fight, shot and killed a rival

gangster. He had taken part in such

scrimmages before, but had never

before he had been shot. Soon after the

incident he learned that the police knew

he had fired the fatal shot, and he did

not know how to escape. He was finally

caught when he was hiding for a few

days until talk of the crime blew over.

I went into retirement in a friend's flat,

and for a week I did not dare show my

face on the street. Things then quieted

down, and I ventured out at night. I

was beginning to think that the affair

had slipped up on it, when a pal took

me aside and told me that the bulls

began to tell on my health. If I was

gan to imagine that I was a would

"I led a wretched life for many

months, and several times I was tempt-

ed to put a gun to my head and end it

they could not find me, reminding me
