TWO KILLED IN IRELAND

Gen. Lucas Goes to England
— Steamers Ordered from
Queenstown to Liverpool.

Dublin, Aug. 2.—Fifty armed men ambushed a military and police party near Brurea on Friday night and an official and a civilian were killed.

Dublin, Aug. 2.—Brigadier General C. H. T. Lucas, who escaped from a Sinn Féin prison on Thursday night, after being kidnapped and held captive for a month, arrived here from Tipperary on Saturday. After remaining until mid-night as the guest of Admiral Sir Reginald Tupper, he embarked on a destroyer for England.

Steamers Diverted.
Queenstown, Ireland, Aug. 2.—The White Star liner Celtic, due here Saturday with 500 passengers for this city, was ordered to proceed to Liverpool. It is surmised the Baltic, upon which Archbishop Mannix of Australia sailed from New York Saturday, will be directed to take a similar course. The Press Association says neither White Star nor Cunard liners will call at Queenstown to disembark passengers until further notice.

**TO STOP IMPORTATION
OF SHOE OPERATORS**
Kitchener, Ont., Aug. 2.—A recent meeting of shoemakers of western Ontario was held here yesterday afternoon to decide as to what steps should be taken to stop the importation of shoe operators from England, it being claimed that at present there were fifty per cent of the operators in Canada who are engaged in other industries.

It was decided to bring the attention of the government to the situation, and request that the importation of operators be stopped.

**INSANE WITH DRINK
KILLED HIS WIFE**
Calgary, Aug. 2.—Believed to have been insane with drink, J. G. Watterson, a well known resident of Fincher Creek, shot and killed his wife in the Kirkham Block, Lethbridge, Saturday afternoon, and then turned the gun on himself, committing suicide. Two children are left.

**AUTOMOBILE TO MOVE
THE CITY TO THE FARM**
Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and Social Organizations Use Motor Vehicles in This Campaign.

(New York Evening Post.)
The Red Cross, the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A. and other social agencies are using passenger cars to aid in answering: "How ya gonna keep 'em down on the farm?"

The Red Cross is using one thousand cars for rural nursing and home service. This number will increase as the work grows. The Red Cross is securing to help the rural people in establishing health standards. It is pushing its work in rural centres so that the farm boy will get the same degree of attention as the man from the city, so that farm life will have the same sanitary advantages of the city. In order to reach the territory which a rural secretary must cover, a passenger car is needed. These cars are provided where possible; and in many places cars are loaned for the purpose.

The way to keep the farm from morning to the city is to move the city to the farm, is the belief of the Y. M. C. A. There are 900 county Y. M. C. A. secretaries in the United States who are motoring around country roads, bringing lectures, athletic events, motion pictures, entertainment and education to school houses, parish houses and other rural centres. Of the 900, 225 have cars as part of their equipment; the remainder borrow cars.

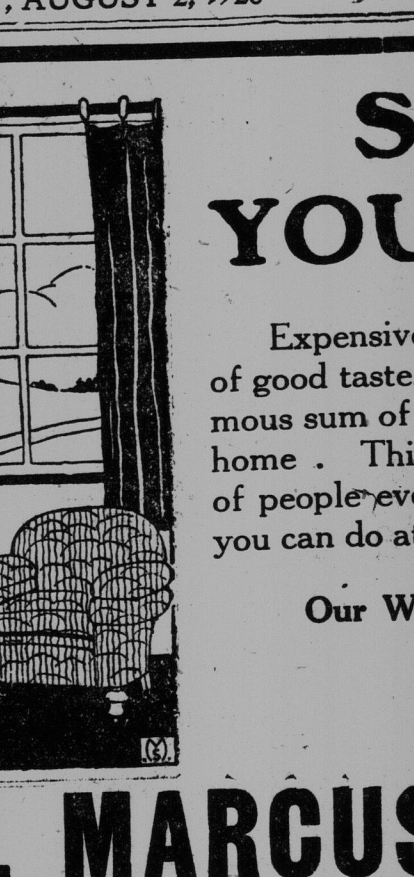
A passenger car is an absolute necessity for the county secretary," said A. E. Roberts, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. county work, when interviewed.

"We specify a car as a part of the ideal equipment. He needs it to cover the territory. Not all of our secretaries have cars, but all are working toward that end; and in time each county centre will be working to full efficiency with a car. Yes, there are 4,000 counties in the United States, so there is unlimited room for expansion in this field."

There are ninety county superintendents of public welfare in North Carolina the great majority of whom own passenger cars. These men serve as organizers of county improvements along various lines, with special reference to child welfare.

The Y. W. C. A. has 1,132 branches in the United States, of which 336 are in counties, sixty-four in towns, thirty-two in cities, and the remainder are student branches. The Y. W. C. A. uses cars where it is necessary for the "workers to travel around and cover large territories. The only way to do this efficiently is by using cars," to quote the headquarters office of the Y. W. C. A. in New York.
