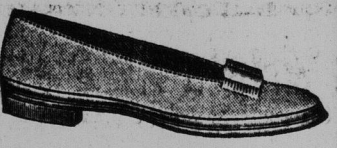

### War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREAT PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

**KEEP AT IT.**  
"The prospect for an extremely high vegetable yield this year are of the brightest, provided the weather keeps right," declares one of the officials at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa. "Keep hoeing." There is an inclination on hot, drowsy June days to let the garden "go hang" but that would be a pity, indeed; for gardens need continuous attention and soon show neglect.

Keep hoeing although it is warm. Go on with successional sowings of lettuce, corn, beans, beets, radishes, etc. Only in this way you will be making the most of the ground at your disposal. Remember that the peas need hilling when they are six inches high to prevent their being broken in the wind.

Cut the weeds down in the morning so that they will wither during the day in the hot sun. Then you can rake them up in the evening. The ground between the vegetable rows should be constantly stirred. Do not be satisfied merely with keeping the weeds in check but increase the fruitfulness of the ground by continual cultivation.

### IS NOT PERMITTED TO ENTER ENGLAND

Dutch Socialist Leader Refused Passports to Attend British Labor Congress.

London, June 18.—Pietter Troelstra, the Dutch Socialist leader, who, after a conference with Philip Scheidemann, leader of the German Socialists party, intended to go to London to attend the annual conference of the British labor congress will not be permitted to enter England, according to the London Standard. Troelstra, it is said has been refused a passport.

Amsterdam, June 18.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—The Dutch branch of the League of Neutral Nations has decided to telegraph Havelock Wilson, president of the British Seamen's Union, warning him against a Dutch Socialist leader named Troelstra, who is intended to proceed to England and France in July to attend the allied Socialist conference, and asking whether British sailors are willing to transport a pro-German, who, at the beginning of the unrestricted submarine warfare, assured German Socialists that Holland would not declare war if Dutch vessels were torpedoed.

### Lewis Gun Comes First

London, June 19.—In the house of commons, today, J. I. MacPherson, under secretary of the war office, said that the committee appointed to test the merits of various machine guns, as a result of the agitation for the use of the Madsen gun by the British army, had placed the various guns examined in the following order:

First, Lewis; second, light Hotchkiss; third, Madsen.

The decision had been unanimous.

### British Labor Is Patriotic

Paris, June 19.—(Via Reuter's Ltd.)—The Petit Parisien today publishes an interview with George H. Roberts, the British minister of labor, in which Mr. Roberts asserted that since the German offensive all agitation concerning the withdrawal of men from their jobs for service in the army had ceased among workers in factories and mines, with the exception of the revolutionary minority of inveterate strikers and pacifists.

The mass of the British working classes, Mr. Roberts said, were frankly patriotic and refused to meet the enemy under any circumstances until he had laid down arms or repudiated his rulers.

### ARRESTS IN IRISH PLOTS EXTEND TO AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, June 19.—It is announced that the government has caused the arrest of seven ringleaders in the Irish Republican brotherhood. It is said the organization planned to enroll volunteers and send them to Ireland to aid in an armed revolt with the object of establishing an Irish republic.
