ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH TO CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY

Ninety Years Since Building Was Dedicated, Though Congregation Was Organized Many Years Before That

The ninetieth anniversary of the erection of their present church building will be observed by the congregation of St. George's Episcopal church, West St. John, next week.

The first rector, after the church became independent of Trinity in 1828, was Rev. Mr. Coster, who continued in charge for forty years. He was followed by Rev. Messrs. Wier, Dowling, Fowler and Dobbs. The present rector, Rev. W. H. Sampson, has occupied the pulpit for the last twenty-two years.

The anniversary will be marked by special services on Sunday next, when Ven. Archdeacon Raymond will preach in the morning and Rev. Mr. Sampson in the evening. In honor of the event there will also be a social gathering of the congregation on Tuesday evening when an interesting programme will be carried out.

ATHENIA OPENS WINTER SEASON

Had a Rough Trip, But Lands First Passengers all in Fine Form

The winterport work at this port for the season of 1911-12 began this morning with the arrival of the Donaldson liner Athenia from Glasgow. She arrived off the island yesterday afternoon, but did not dock until twelve o'clock today on account of the tides not answering. She left the island a little after ten o'clock this morning and the first passengers were allowed off at exactly twelve o'clock.

There were eighty-nine passengers on board, twenty-six first cabin and the remainder steerage. The steerage passengers were mostly all Scotch settlers bound for the west. They are a fine healthy looking crowd of people.

As soon as the steamer docked, Immigration agent Langdon and his staff and also the customs and baggage inspectors boarded the boat and found everything satisfactory. The Athenia left Glasgow on Nov. 11, and had a very rough trip across. There was but little sickness on board. The steamer this year is in command of Commander William McNeill, who is well known at this port, having been sailing to this port for several seasons. The other officers on board are: Dr. Yates, surgeon; A. H. Wotherspoon, purser; J. Watt, assistant purser; J. H. Brown, chief officer; R. Matheson, chief steward; Mrs. Macintosh, Mrs. Paterson and Mrs. Egan, stewardesses. All of the officers have sailed to this port before on Donaldson liners.

EFFICIENCY OF ST. JOHN SIGNALLERS GIVEN RECOGNITION

Local Men Chosen as Instructors of Classes - City School To Open on April 16

The enviable standard of efficiency attained by the members of No. 8 Signalling Section of this city, in command of Lieut. Allan Leavitt, has been recognized by those in charge of signalling operations in Canada, and a compliment has been paid to the local body in that one of their members is chosen to act as instructor at the school of instruction which has been arranged to open in this city on April 16.

While one of the regular men from Halifax, Corporal Lewis of the R. C. R., has been chosen to conduct schools in many cities of the maritime provinces, in St. John a request has been made upon Captain P. E. E. Powers, commander of signalling in the eastern division, for a local instructor to be furnished for other New Brunswick schools. It is probable that Arthur Lindsay, sergeant instructor will be the choice.

Another Step in Advance Taken at a Meeting Last Evening

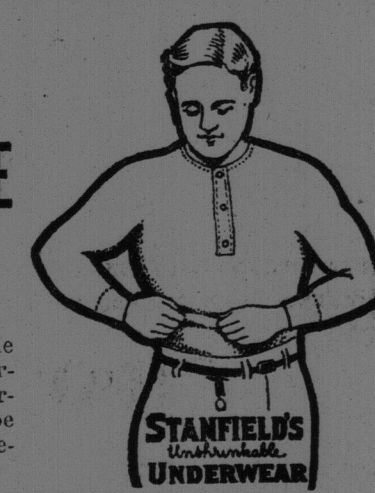
The work of preparing the new charter for the city under the commission form of government, as proposed, steadily and, considering the amount of work involved, rapidly.

POLICE COURT TODAY

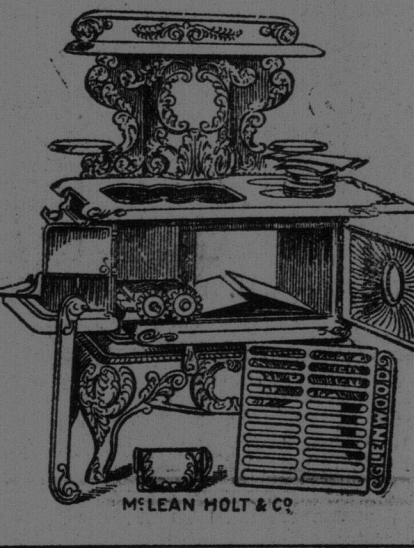

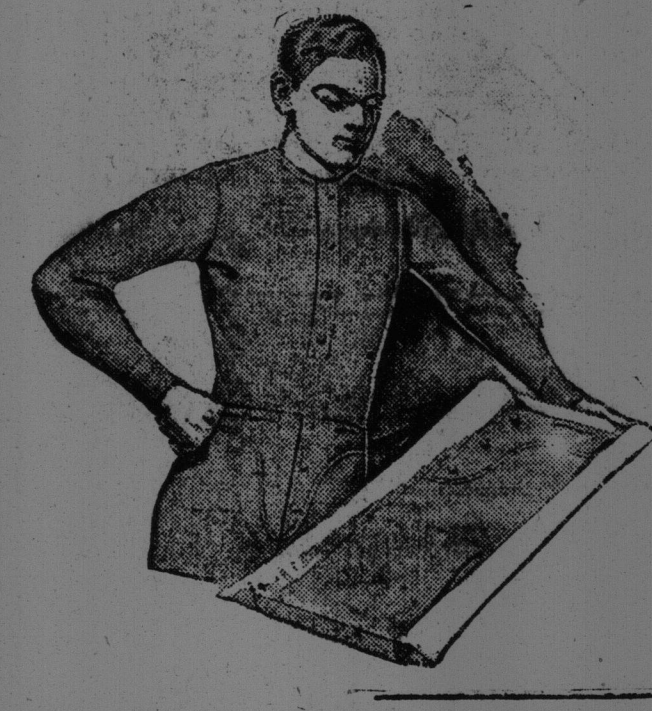
