King's weather on Thursday was all that St. John needed to complete the celebration of the coronation of King George and Queen Mary as the nation's future sovereigns. 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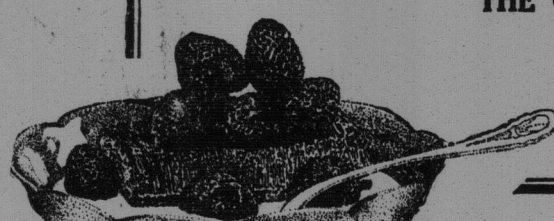
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
