THE STRIKE SITUATION IMPROVED

London, Aug. 11--Considerable improvement in the strike situation was evident today and orders for troops to come into the city were countermanded. Some cavalry had already gone aboard the special trains at Aldershot when their officers received word that they were not needed in London. The trains, however, remained on the sidings, their locomotives with steam up, so that they could be moved at a moment's notice.

The settlement of the carters' grievances, with the dock laborers some days ago, formed the bulk of the difference of the employers and lightermen with their employees was hourly expected. Some of the strike leaders were optimistic, but their men did not appear to share their views.

The streets, however, were still without their usual stream of carts, and while conditions in the strike were better, the residents of the city of this town felt the shortage of provisions more keenly. In some districts the provision stores were closed because of the lack of supplies. A considerable amount of meat reached Smithfield market in the early hours of today. The various market stalls were snatching a few hours' rest. There was some rioting, but on the whole the police had less trouble than they had yesterday.

On the other hand at some of the railway stations the tie-up was more complete than yesterday, and the police reserves were held in readiness to put down possible disorders. Even should a settlement be reached with the lightermen and watermen, who demand a ten-hour working day at the same wages now received, during the day the business of London will not be able to resume its normal progress before Monday at the earliest.

The effect of the walkout of the men is being felt in all directions. Several of the newspapers appeared today curtailed in length, owing to a shortage in the paper supply. The Rothchilds were obliged yesterday to discontinue their bullion for a time as attempts to convey bullion to the refinery were being frustrated.

The government announced this afternoon that they have taken all necessary military and other precautions to safeguard London's food supply. A serious riot was averted when vans issued from the grounds of Buckingham palace closely guarded by police. The riotous mob, containing the baggage of the King, who has gone to York, it had been feared that the rioters might intercept the Royal edicts.

HEAVY PROPERTY LOSS IN FLORENCEVILLE FIRE

Eleven Stores and Residences Totally Destroyed While Owners Looked On Helplessly Rain Checked Spread of Fires at Penobscis

The estimated loss in the Florenceville fire of last night is \$30,000, the larger portion of which will be total, as from what can be learned the insurance will fall far short of this amount. An eye witness of the fire telephoned to the Times today that there will be some considerable suffering as many will be homeless, there not being available homes for all.

Penobscis by a high wind and everything very dry the flames leaped from one building to another with great rapidity and people in moon cases stood and saw their homes with all household effects burned.

E. B. Gallinger removed his furniture only to have it burned outside. John Smith suffered the loss of everything including clothing and household effects. Some furniture that was removed, was so badly broken that it might better have been left to burn.

The fire stopped at the residence of Dr. Hagerman, who had a western hall of water in the cellar of his house. This was carried in buckets to the roof by means of ladders, and running down the gutters on the roof returned to the street.

In a considerable portion of the insurance companies there was plenty available. It is considerably doubtful that much if any of the burned areas will be rebuilt as most of those burned out had all their savings invested in their homes with little, if any, insurance. With the exception of water pumped from two or three wells, there was no water to fight the fire with.

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The heavy rain here this morning has lessened the hearts of farmers. It was gladly received.
