An Agitation on Foot in the House of Commons.

Sir Charles H. Tupper Tells What we May Expect From the States.

Ottawa, March 9.—In the Yukon debate to-day there was a sturdy ring of independence in Sir Charles H. Tupper's advice to the government to pause before risking a dollar of Canadian cash or an acre of Canadian land in an enterprise that depended for its success upon the good will and generosity of the United States. If he said Canadian Statesmen were afraid to speak boldly upon the subject of our unneighborly treatment by the Republic to the south of us, British statesmen were made of sterner stuff, and to show it he read the firm reply of Mr. Chamberlain to the famous "shirt-sleeves" despatch of Secretary Sherman. If he argued, the Americans, in defiance of international law and treaty regulations, could seize and harass Canadian ships engaged in lawful enterprise on the high seas, what treatment could be expected of them towards Canadian commerce at an American port when American citizens were clamoring for the advantage of this trade?

The debate lasted until midnight and was then adjourned.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Mr. Fortin introduced a bill to amend the Weights and Measures Act to provide for a standard of weight or quantity for potatoes when sold by the bag. At present, what a bag of potatoes is supposed to contain and one-half bushels, or 30 pounds there is, he said, no standard to guarantee the quantity. The bill would make the standard 80 pounds weight to the bag.

Mr. Fisher supported the bill.

Sir Henri Joly said he intended introducing a bill which would cover the case. It would deal with standards of weight generally.

The potato question broadened into a discussion of weights and measures generally.

Mr. Wallis asked for a standard milk can. Mr. Monk asked that the bag of potatoes weight be fixed at 70 pounds. In Dr. Sprague's constituency the farmers preferred the 50-pound standard. Mr. Talbot wanted the standard to be a bushel of 36 pounds.

The bill was read the first time.

AN INSOLVENCY BILL.

Mr. Fortin, the Liberal member for Laval, will introduce an Insolvency Bill in the Commons.

The annual report of the Minister of Railways and Canals shows that the gross earnings of all the government roads for the past fiscal year amounted to \$3,000,000—a decrease of \$80,000 compared with the previous year.

Working expenses \$3,177,250—a decrease of \$77,275. The net loss for the year was \$177,250.

The two hundred Canadian regulars who are to be sent to the Yukon must assemble in Ottawa, although it has not yet been definitely decided, Col. Lake, of the Militia Department, said to-day that the men will need no special drill or instruction, but will be put under competent officers. The Department is engaged preparing for the equipment of the force, with necessary outfits to withstand the climate.

FARRAR CAUSING TROUBLE.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell called attention to a paragraph in the newspapers from Washington to the effect that Mr. Edward Farrar, who was credited with being in Washington in the interest of the Canadian government, had given evidence before the senate committee of lands. In the senate committee of lands, Mr. Farrar was made to give the assurance that he was of the opinion that the Canadian government would consent to the appointment of an international commission to arrange all difficulties with regard to the bonding privileges on the Atlantic and the Pacific and that Canada was, in his opinion, willing to make the concession of free shipment of fish through Canada in return for the bonding privileges at Wrangel. There was no doubt, said Sir Mackenzie, from the utterances of Senator Hannabrough in the United States, that the members of that body were influenced, in passing the bill, recently enacted with regard to the bonding of fish, by the evidence given by Mr. Farrar before the lands committee, and he wanted to know whether Mr. Farrar, when on a previous occasion entered into a treacherous
