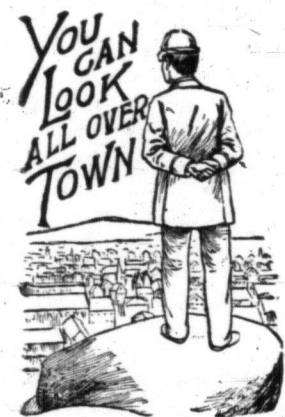

The municipal council of the township of Howara met on Saturday 5th. All members present.

Communications.

From Walter Mills, barrister, stating that he had been instructed by A. Gessner, of Orford, to notify council as to damages to spoil of access, owing to defective road, con. 12. No action.

From Dr. R. Farquharson, clerk of Tilbury East, asking the co-operation of municipalities in securing legislation so that railways shall be under the same jurisdiction as farm lands in reference to drainage.

From E. E. Ward, manager of the Bank stating that there was on April 4th to the credit of municipality \$3,850.42.

From Henry Watson, clerk of Orford, notifying council that they had appointed A. R. McDonald arbitrator re section 3, Orford and 5 Howard.

Reports.

From John Crowder, reeve, stating that he had investigated the grievance of Mr. Anderson re Anderson Drain, and had seen the commissioner, who agreed to have same completed before the first meeting of council; also met parties on a drain, 2nd con., but as all parties interested were not present could not agree.

From J. C. Palmer, commissioner on the Melarty and Greenway drain, stating that same had been completed in accordance with specifications at a cost of \$145.44.

From John Crowder, J. S. Boothroyd and A. F. Campbell, committee appointed to examine site for gravel pit, reported that they had examined site on lot 12, con. 9, and lot 13, con. 10, and considered both good, but would recommend purchasing on lot 13, con. 10, as it would contain more gravel, if same could be procured at a fair price.

From John Crowder and A. F. Campbell in reference to river road, consider that if land could be purchased from F. A. Jackman, H. Secord and W. Cullinane at a reasonable price, could make a good road as a cost of about \$350, but would not recommend acquisition this year.

From Geo. McDonald, as secretary of R. of H. stating that he had procured one house for scarlet fever and disinfecting another for diphtheria, and also on complaint of several taxpayers had had three horses buried at a cost of \$150, and recommended that \$150 of said amount be charged to wh. lot 15, and \$150 to a wh. lot 12, con. 11, but the remainder will have to be charged to general fund as said nuisance was placed on a lot by some unknown party.

From Jas. A. Bell, C. E. for the repair and improving of the Fields Creek drain, stating that it required repaving to the 3rd con., at a cost of \$511.38.

From Angus Smith, C. E. for the improving and repaving of the South Marsh drain, stating that the whole drain required improving, more especially the north branch, which is very much out of repair. Cost of drain \$750.

Moved by Campbell and Handy, that the accounts as presented be paid and the money drawn on treasurer for same.—Carried.

Moved by Campbell and Handy, that E. A. Jackman be paid \$7 for road across dirt lot 17, con. 1, during high water.—Carried.

Moved by Handy and Campbell, that the reeve be authorized to sign necessary papers for removal of Nelson Shaw to house of refuge; also that Jos. Boothroyd attend to his removal.—Carried.

By-law for appointing Jas. Harst arbitrator for S. S. No. 6, Orford, and No. 5, Howard, and a by-law for borrowing on the credit of S. S. No. 13, \$3,000, was read the required number of times and finally passed. By-laws for the repairing and improving of Fields Creek drain, Clark drain and the South Marsh drain were provisionally adopted.

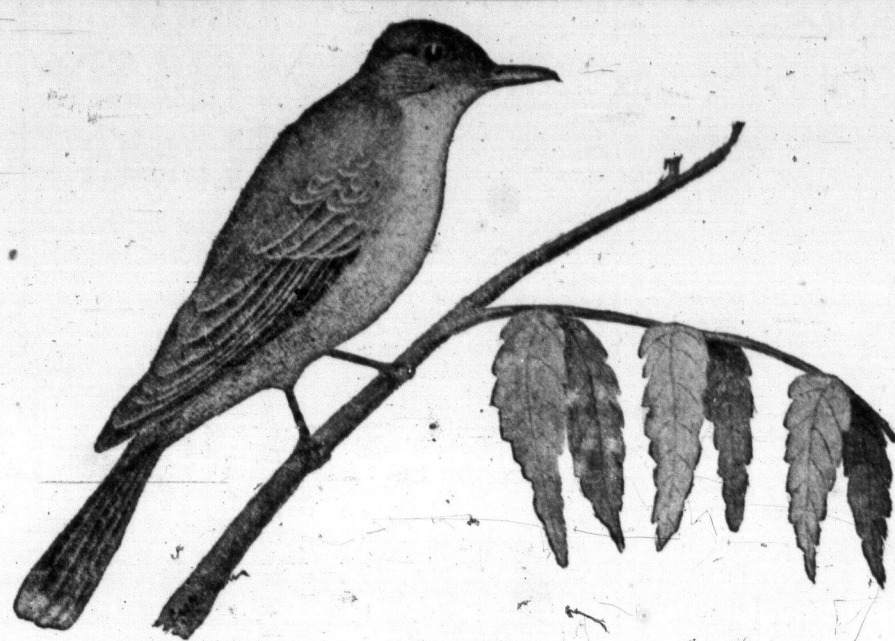
