NEW YORK IN GRIP OF STORM TODAY

Street Car Service Hampered by the Snow.

Many Homeless Persons Seek Shelter—Heavy Snowfall in Different Parts of the State.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—The center of the western blizzard which has been approaching since yesterday struck this city in full force this morning. Accompanied by a high east wind, a heavy fall of wet snow succeeding a rainfall throughout the night, filled the streets with slippery slush which early threatened to delay all means of transportation in the city and suburbs except the subway. The fall of snow excepted the street car lines and railroads promptly attacked it in a desperate effort to keep the lines open. Thousands of men were put to work by the street cleaning department and the main thoroughfares down town were in fair condition for the early rush of office employees to their offices. Although electric sweepers were run at frequent intervals on the cross town lines there were many delays. The frequent accidents to pedestrians who were blinded by the driving snow were reported. James Barry, aged 75, was struck by a Madison Avenue car, at Fifth-street and thrown into the gutter sustaining a probable fracture of the skull.

Ferry traffic across the harbor and rivers was not materially disarranged although there were some delays. During the night three hundred persons sought shelter in the city lodges houses and others were given shelter in the Recreation pier at the foot of East 34th street.

Included in this number were about forty women and children. Most of the men were put to work cleaning the snow from the streets.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Seven inches of snow, the heaviest fall since the season, descended upon Syracuse last night, and the weather offices state that the fall will continue today. Railroad trains are about on time.

BUFFALO, Jan. 30.—Five inches of snow have fallen here since yesterday and it is still snowing. There has been interruption whatever to trolley or traffic.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—The local weather bureau has received the following special from Washington: "Changed to north-east storm warnings 10 a. m. from Savannah to New York. High west winds indicated for the next 24 hours."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The temperature falling rapidly in its path and snow and sleet in many sections marking its sweep eastward, the center of the storm that has raged with great force through practically all of the country east of the Rocky Mountains today is centered over New England. Through the west and largely throughout the south there is a cold snap and the weather bureau today predicted freezing temperatures in the fruit belt of Florida. Snow is reported west of there as far as the Mississippi River and north of Florida. It will be much colder in the Eastern States tonight to tomorrow.

In the far west intense cold is reported, 24 degrees below zero being reported in the north west.

REAL ESTATE COMMANDS HIGH VALUE IN MONTREAL

Carley's Store Property For Sale—Agents Say It Should Bring \$750,000

MONTREAL, Jan. 30.—The Carley Departmental store property is for sale and the real estate agents fix the price at about \$750,000. They value it at \$42 a square foot on St. James St. side which contains 4,700 feet and \$40 on Notre Dame which contains 11,100 feet. This figures out at \$3,900 per foot frontage on St. James street, and \$2,700 frontage on Notre Dame St.

W. M. JARVIS WILL SUE THE CITY FOR \$125

On Alleged Overcharge in His Tax Bill—Decision Will Affect Many Other Owners.

It is understood that W. M. Jarvis intends to sue the city for \$125 alleged overcharge on the taxes of some property on the South Market wharf. He claimed that the city increased the rent of the property and then on account of this raised the taxes. The assessors held that the increase was caused by an actual increase in valuation and on this ground the claim was turned down at a meeting of the committee last week. The matter is a small one in itself but it would be of great importance on account of its effect on many other properties if the decision should go against the city.

POOR BILLY McLEAN IS OUT IN THE COLD

Conservative Whip Fails to Provide for World Editor

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 29.—The party status of W. F. McLean, M. P., was rejected by the opposition and in a measure adopted by the government. The incident occurred when Sir Wilfrid and Liberal Whip Calvert and R. L. Borden, with Conservative Whip assessors held the men from each side whom they wanted on the standing committee.

Mr. Borden remarked to Mr. Taylor that he did not seem to have provided a place for W. F. McLean, whom he had always before looked after.

Mr. Taylor—He did not see me to look after him, besides he is the third party.

Sir Wilfrid—Oh, we must provide for McLean.

Mr. Calvert—There is a vacancy on the Finance committee; put him down for that.

Mr. Borden agreed with this, and Mr. McLean was named for all the committees on which he sat last session.

Already a company has been organized to manufacture the Billy possum. It is fondly hoped by the directors of the company that before many months the Billy possum will be perched on automobiles, victorias and baby carriages and will have become an essential of every well appointed nursery.

A woman well known in society in New York gave her views on the Billy possum question to a reporter for the Herald yesterday.

"Do you know," she said, "I think the scheme is a screen. I've ordered two dozen of the little dears." A business man with a large family and many daughters was not quite so optimistic. His sentiments were something as follows: "I'm sick of these peripatetic pests."

The originator of the plan to adopt the little animal as the new national pet is Mrs. De Forest Allgood, of Atlanta. Soon the manufacture of the toys will begin, and if they "catch on" in popular favor it is believed that the Teddy bear will be ousted from its present aristocratic berth.

THE COOPER TRIAL

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 30.—The tenth day of the trial of Col. Duncan Cooper, Robin J. Cooper and John D. Sharp for the murder of former Senator E. W. Carmack opened today with less than a hundred of the 300 lawyers summoned in court. The jury box now contains nine men, one of whom it is considered will be released because of his health.

Judge W. M. Hart had announced that he would not hold sessions on Saturday, but decided to violate his own order until after the jury is secured. Most of the testimony yet to be examined on the third avenue of the 500 men, are citizens of Nashville, most of whom have read the testimony of the witnesses at the hearing for bonds and who are thus disqualified for jury service under the Tennessee laws.

EARTHQUAKE REPORTS WERE EXAGGERATED

Very Little Damage Has Been Done in Spain.

A Few Houses Were Cracked, the People Were Frightened, But That Is About All

MADRID, Jan. 30.—All communication with Southern Spain and with the City of Barcelona is interrupted and normal, and the reports emanating from England relative to a disastrous earthquake and a tidal wave are untrue. There was a slight earth shock 470 miles in the province of Murcia but no serious damage was done. The walls of only a few houses were cracked. A slight shock was felt in the village of Olais. At both Totana and Olais the inhabitants fled panic stricken to the suburbs, fearing that a disaster was upon them such as devastated Messina, Italy.

The seismic disturbances were registered on the instrument of the Institute of the Institute at Valencia. It is reported that the moment, the quake occurred the sun was hidden by a dense gray cloud which, however, disappeared immediately while a shower of hail stones as large as walnuts covered the ground to a depth of several centimeters.

PARIS, Jan. 30.—A special despatch from Madrid confirms the report of a light earthquake shock at Totana, Spain. No serious damage was done. The walls of a few houses cracked and threatened to collapse. Shocks were also felt in the neighborhood village of Olais.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Special despatches to Reuters' news agency from Madrid say that there is no serious damage from a serious earthquake in Southern Spain and Barcelona. All communications with these sections is normal.

MADRID, Jan. 30.—A message has just been received here from Barcelona saying the reports of a disastrous earthquake and tidal wave at this city are absolutely untrue.

SCOTT ACT INFORMER FINED FOR SELLING LIQUOR

MONROTON, N. B., Jan. 30.—With the promotion of H. D. McKenna from mechanical superintendent at Stellarton to master mechanic at Monroton, the promotion of Angus McDonald, from foreman of the carpenter shop to car foreman. Both positions these men will hold were formerly looked after by the late A. B. McMillan.

GRAFT CHARGES DID NOT KEEP HIM OUT OF OFFICE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—The nomination of Daniel J. Keefe, to be commissioner-general of immigration, was confirmed today by the senate. Mr. Keefe's nomination has been held up since December 4, because of charges that the office was given him because of his assistance in getting labor votes for the Republican ticket in the late campaign.

Opposition appeared to have vanished today and the nomination was not debated.

BRIEF DESPATCHES.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—A four masted schooner during the storm this morning ran into the Scotland lightship and damaged the vessel, staying in her bow and breaking her anchor chain.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 30.—Herbert Foundry, 45 years of age, of Providence R. I., treasurer of the Builders' Iron Foundry of that city, was found dead in bed at the Fort Pitt hotel here to-day.

ADDIS ABABAH, Jan. 29.—The reports recently circulated in Europe and America that King Menelik was desperately ill and even that he had died was wildly exaggerated. The king is a chronic invalid but there is nothing in his condition today to cause immediate alarm.

SITUATE, Mass., Jan. 30.—A large three masted schooner was washed ashore on the Fourth Cliff, this city, today. She appears to be in a bad position. The life savers of the Fourth Cliff Station have gone to her assistance. The name of the schooner cannot be made out from shore.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Mrs. Woolley, wife of Al Woolley, a hotel keeper, of Rochester, whose name was given yesterday as Alice Duffey, and who was burned in a fire in a rooming house in this city, died early today. Another Rochester woman, Josephine Walker, was burned and her spine was injured in jumping from a window.

NEW YORKERS DO NOT WISH JAPANESE OFFENDED

Board of Trade Points Out the Value of Amicable Relations to the Nation's Commerce

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—An important movement with respect to the Japanese question in California was inaugurated today at a meeting of the Board of Trade and Transportation's Committee on foreign and insular trade. It was decided to recommend to the board that the merchants and manufacturers of all the other states to co-operate with them in improving upon the people of California, the unwieldy of persistent discrimination against the people of a nation, Japan, that has shown its title to the respect of the world at large; that has proven itself to be a grave factor in the civilizing and progressive influence of the world and whose trade is of importance to this country.

It was pointed out that while Japan sells us thirty millions more annually than we sell Japan, it is also true that the sixty-nine millions of goods which she sells us consist almost entirely of raw materials, which are not produced in this country, such as tea and raw silk, while the thirty-nine millions of goods which we export to Japan consists of manufactured articles, the product of our factories and workshops.
