..... 74 73 CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 30.—According to advice received here the Bulgarian government has adopted an uncompromising attitude on the question of the amount of indemnity to be paid Turkey as result of the Bulgarian declaration of independence, last October. There can be no increase, it is declared on the present offer of \$2,000,000 francs \$16,400,000, and it is further intimated that should a settlement on that basis be delayed much longer Bulgaria will reconsider her position.
