REV. J. J. McCASKILL ASKED TO APPEAR BEFORE PRESBYTERY

THE PICTURE HOUSES STRONGLY DENOUNCED

Rev. S. W. Anthony Hits From the Shoulder.

Subjects of Pictures Not Elevating, But Degrading and Disgusting, He Says—Good Opportunities Wasted.

Rev. S. W. Anthony of the Congregational Church in a sermon on Temperance delivered last night referred in scathing terms to the pictures which are presented at the moving picture houses in St. John. He explained his reason for going to one of these shows was that his wife wanted to hear the music, and humorously remarked that this looked like another case of Adam blaming Eve for leading him into temptation.

Regarding the music which he heard Mr. Anthony said that it was excellent and would be all right in a different environment, but he expressed regret that they should be exposed to such demoralizing influences.

In addition to the demoralizing influences of the pictures Mr. Anthony also referred to the money wasted on these shows by people who could not afford it.

The preacher recognized the educational possibilities of moving pictures and thought that the free school should be able to secure better subjects for their shows.

WILL CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING

Mr. and Mrs. John March Fifty Years Wed

Anniversary Comes on March 22nd and Will be Marked by a Family Reunion at Their Home in Hampton

Three weeks from today Mr. and Mrs. John March, of Hampton, will observe their golden wedding anniversary. Both are in excellent health and look forward to many more years of happiness.

Mr. and Mrs. March were married at the Baptist parsonage, at St. George, on March 22nd, 1859. The bride of 60 years ago was Miss Mary E. Bucknam, daughter of the late Barnabas C. Bucknam of Pennfield. The groom who had come from London in 1858, was principal of the grammar school. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Stephen March, brother of the groom, since deceased.

After their marriage the young couple came to St. John to live where during the period from 1859 till 1888 Mr. March engaged in different occupations and held responsible positions. He was for a quarter of a century school superintendent and secretary of the board of trustees and had the honor of inaugurating the free school system in St. John. He spent some years in journalism, and was also for a time engaged in commercial life, and conducted business as a photographer.

Mr. and Mrs. March removed in 1886 to Hampton where they have since resided.

Five children, all sons, have been born to them, one dying in infancy. The others were the late Dr. J. E. March, Ernest C. of West Somerville, Cecil S. of St. John, and Ralph A. March, of Hampton. There are many grandchildren and one great grandchild, all of whom it is hoped, will join in the quiet family reunion by which the half century milestone will be marked on the twenty-second of this month Mr. March is now well along in the sevenies.

METHODIST PASTOR LAUDS BISHOP CASEY

Rev. I. N. Parker Praises the Lenten Pastoral Letter

Protestants May Well Endorse the Thoughts Expressed by His Lordship, Which Should Appeal to All Christians

Rev. I. N. Parker, during the course of his sermon in one of the churches on the Westford Methodist circuit yesterday, took occasion to refer to the Catholic church. Mr. Parker mentioned that during the heat of the recent political campaign many people, even among the thinking classes, had given expression to unworthy sentiments with regard to the province of Quebec, had referred to the undesirable condition that a Roman Catholic is head of the government, and had in various ways exhibited an unchristian sentiment against the Catholic church. But, on the other hand, he pointed out that had these people taken the trouble to read the letter sent by the Archbishop of Quebec to his clergy, they might have found reason to change their preconceived and unworthy opinions. Even as late as last week Bishop Casey of St. John, had issued a pastoral letter the sentiments of which might with honor be adopted by the other denominations. Bishop Casey's words, said Mr. Parker, revealed a conception of the Christian duty which is often apparently lacking among Protestants. Every word of advice given by his lordship could with profit be repeated from Protestant pulpits; the sentiments expressed were manly, noble and Christian. No Methodist clergyman could say anything better, nor more closely in line with the teachings of his church, than were the suggestions laid down by Bishop Casey. "I honor his Lordship," said Rev. Mr. Parker, "as a noble, broad-minded, God-fearing man, who, although differing from some of us in certain points of doctrine and otherwise, stands before all creeds as an exponent of those things to which true Christianity leads."
