### BUSY SESSION OF THE DIVORCE COURT OPENS AT FREDERICTON ON TUESDAY Four New Cases and One Unfinished One on the Docket—One Case Unusual, Others for Ordinary Causes.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 19.—The divorce court will open here on Tuesday with four new cases and one partly finished on the program. Judge McKeown will preside.  
The unfinished case is that of Matilda vs John A. Wright, of St. Martins, in which further evidence is to be taken. The ground for application for divorce is impotency.  
Mrs. E. Katherine Ebbett, of Peel, Carleton county, is seeking a divorce from her husband, Alfred L. Ebbett, of the same place. They were married on May 17th, 1905, by Rev. E. W. Simonsen, a church of England minister. Mrs. Ebbett being formerly a Miss Lovely. On March 17th, 1909, a son was born as the result of the union. The defendant charged with adultery on July, 1909 and Hannah Gibson is mentioned as the co-respondent. Since July last the plaintiff has resided with her father and claims that the relations between her husband and Miss Gibson caused her to leave her husband's home. The plaintiff asks for alimony under the divorce.  
Alonso Hornam is seeking a divorce from his wife Barbara Jane Hornam. They were married in Moncton in 1888 by Rev. James H. Tallot and Henry Fortune is named as the co-respondent. The divorce is sought on the usual grounds.  
Mrs. Josephine Maud Gibbons, of Kings county, formerly Miss Worden, is seeking a separation from her husband Geo. H. Gibbons, to whom she was married on March 14th, 1909, by H. H. Ferguson, at Milltown, Kings county. The plaintiff claims incompatibility on the part of the defendant and asks for a separation.

### LAWYERS SQUABBLE OVER ESTATE CASE Unable to Reach Compromise in Probate Fall Brother and Half Sister Seek Appointment—John Kerr Proposed as Administrator.

Further hearing in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Elizabeth, late of this city, widow, occupied the attention of acting Justice of Probate J. B. M. Baxter this morning.  
Thirteen hundred dollars, three lawyers and the competency or incompetency of a petitioner, together with frequent sittings between counsel are involved. The latter, however, are only in incidental matters and not according to the court schedule, having been introduced by the lawyers themselves. M. On the 7th of this month D. Mullin, K. C., presented the petition of P. H. Donohue, a full brother of the deceased, praying that letters of administration be granted to him.  
On the same day A. O. Earle, K. C., presented a petition of Elizabeth Donohue and Mrs. Mary Manning, half-sisters of the deceased, asking that letters be granted to the former. Dr. Earle is appointed trustee of letters to Mrs. Donohue, claimed that the latter was incompetent. This hearing is for the purpose of endeavoring to state the competency or incompetency of that petitioner as he being a full brother of the deceased. The case is continued in court this morning, preference over relatives of half-blood.  
Dr. Earle is represented for Arinola Erchols of Roxbury, Mass., a daughter of a full sister of the deceased.  
Mr. Kerr and the court suggested an adjournment to hold a conference with a view to arranging a settlement. The court adding that there is only thirteen hundred dollars involved, and these hearings are expensive.  
Mr. Mullin agreed, and thought twenty minutes would be long enough. Dr. Earle said that before the case had come into court and before the 'lines of the unfortunate family had been washed clean' he had endeavored to get his learned friend (Mullin) to come to a settlement.  
Mr. Mullin thought the learned doctor was in error.  
The doctor, in no mild tones denied the court looked at it was now 11:30 and suggested they take a half an hour or to try to arrange a settlement.  
Dr. Earle thought that this would not give them sufficient time.  
The court, Mr. Kerr and Mr. Mullin thought differently and said so. The former very emphatically.  
Dr. Earle again reiterated his view that the time was too short and suggested going on with the case.  
Mr. Mullin asked leave to consult his client for a minute. Granted.  
Dr. Earle informed the court that he has the highest regard for Mr. John Kerr, K. C., but he will not accept him.  
The court again suggested a conference with a view to a settlement.  
Dr. Earle did not see his way clear to carry out the court's suggestion.  
Mr. Mullin observed that Dr. Earle is unreasonable.  
Mr. Kerr concurred.  
Dr. Earle, with some heat, denied this.  
The court suggested that the case go on between the petitioner, Mr. Donohue, and witness in which, according to witness the petitioner declared himself to be incompetent to carry on the business of the estate.  
It being one o'clock adjournment was made until Monday morning.

### TERRIBLE DEED OF MINE OPERATOR Shot His Three Children, Nurse and Himself Autopsy on British Officer's Daughter—Negro Prisoners Smuggled Out of Town.

BERMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 19.—George Stephens, son of a prominent mine operator, today shot and instantly killed three of his little children and his nurse, and then turned the pistol on himself and ended his own life.  
NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—An autopsy will be performed today to ascertain the cause of death of Mrs. Lucille Clark, the 22 year old daughter of a British Army officer, who died in a hotel here yesterday. Attending physicians say the girl probably died from stromaine poisoning. Mrs. Clark came here from India last fall with Mr. and Mrs. Fay, of India, who left last Wednesday for Santa Barbara, Cal. Mrs. Clark expected to join them in a few days.  
CAIRO, Illa., Feb. 19.—Surrounded by a hundred infantrymen, twelve convicted prisoners who were sentenced yesterday by Judge Butler to varying terms in the Chester prison, were taken to the prison this morning. Among the prisoners was John Pratt, the negro purse snatcher, whose arrest yesterday was the result of a chase that was followed by four officers were wounded. The plans of the military and civil officials to execute the prisoners in the town without a demonstration were entirely successful, but few people knew of the move. Intense excitement saw the departure was small. Last night passed quietly and without disturbance.

### COMMISSION WILL CONTROL UTILITIES

Bill Introduced in the Local Legislature  
Will Control Rates and Companies Must Pay Expenses—Debate on Address Continued.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 19.—The introduction of the government bill for the control of public utility corporations by a commission was the most important business in the legislature yesterday. The bill is patterned after the Nova Scotia act. The debate on the speech from the throne was continued by Mr. Copp and Mr. Fleming. Several notices of enquiry were given by the members of both sides.  
Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced the public utility bill. It provided that all rates, etc., would be under the control of the commission, whose expenses would be paid by the companies interested.  
Hon. Mr. Hazen said the telephone act provides that the government could take over the telephone company by paying ten per cent more than the amount invested and that the company could not increase its tolls when its annual dividend. This bill should prove a great benefit to the province.  
The Nova Scotia government had last year paid a compliment to the government of New Brunswick in copying the Nova Scotia act. The Nova Scotia act perhaps it was well that the commission should be returned.  
In a forcible address Mr. Copp sharply criticised the government's policy in many matters. He strongly advocated better measures for forest conservation. All the government had done for the Cuban potato business was to purchase a second hand stove from the school pension fund were ridiculous. Hardly one person in the province could qualify. The premier, while he promised action in the Valley Road scheme, had not given any response to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's letter.  
Hon. Mr. Fleming attempted to defend the government's policy and mentioned details regarding the Cuban potato trade, with which he claimed to be familiar.  
Mr. Trevelyan gave notice of enquiry regarding the retirement of John McMullin from office of Factory Inspector. House adjourned at 6:15 p.m.
