FINANCIAL TABRIZ NOT SUPPORT IS **ENTERED BY PROMISED RUSSIANS**

Windsor, N. S., April 28.—At a meeting of the Alumni Association of Kings College the following were elected to fill the vacancies on the board of governors: Dr. Thos. Tremaine, of Halifax, who has been president for 28 years, was re-elected, H. H. Pickett, St. John, C. E. Gregory, K. C., of Antigonish, Reginald V. Harris, Halifax. The latter was chosen to fill the vacancy made by the death of the late James Morrow, of Halifax. The report of the Executive Committee showed the affairs of the society to be in a most flourish condition. The erection of a new house for the president and of a building devoted entirely to lecturing purposes was strongly recommended. A resolution promising finalcial support to any new building the governors might wish to erect was passed. The business transacted was mainly routine though there was a very lively discussion in regard to the admittance of students of twenty-one years of age to membership, in the alumni. It was however, decided to do so. At a meeting of the governors this afternoon the Executive Committee for this year was constituted as follows: C. S. Wilcox, Rev. G. R. Martell, of Windsor, C. E. Gregory, of Antigonish, Judge Forbes, W. C. Milner, W. L. Payzant, R. J. Wilson, Halifax, Dr. M. A. B. Smith, Dartmouth, F. J. G. Knowlton, A. C. Fairweather, St. John. The reports were most entouraging, the number of students in attendance being the largest in the history of the college. H. L. Jones, the agent, gave a most satisfactory report. The people were everywhere rallying to the support of Kings financially and otherwise.

THE GOVERNMENT SHOULD DO SOMETHING

"The Government," declares the Toronto Globe, discussing the production of the Mayes affidavit in the House of Commons, "cannot authorize anyone to investigate a charge that has not been made." But a charge has been made. A Government contractor, under oath, has declared that he paid five cents a cubic yard to a warm friend of the Liberal party in order to secure a dredging contract, and, moreover, that he could not secure his money after the work had been performed to the satisfaction of the Government officials until he had paid over this consideration. According to the Globe's theory, this is not a charge against the Government until it is fathered by some member of the House of Commons. It is absolutely necessary that some member should declare that the charges are true, should make them his own, before the Government can recognize their existence. It was not always thus. It will be remembered that a newspaper not long ago made charges against a minister of the Crown. These charges were not repeated in the House of Commons, but the minister, nevertheless, resigned his portfolio, the resignation being accepted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in a communication in which the following sentences were included: You owe it to yourself, to your colleagues and friends to clear your character of the charges levelled against it. You could well ignore mere insinuations, but direct and specific charges you do well to face as soon as uttered." In the Mayes affidavit there are direct and specific charges against a Government department. No one may deny that. A contractor alleges that he paid \$35,000 for political influence which secured for him a contract that he had been unable to otherwise obtain; that this \$35,000 was added to the price he had offered to do the work for in the first place, and that the balance due upon his bill was only paid by the department after he had made this payment for political influence. If it appeared to Sir Wilfrid Laurier but right and proper that one of his ministers should resign his portfolio in order to face accusations made against his personal character, which in no way affected his efficiency as a minister, made by a newspaper, why is it right that a department of the public service, its administrators and officials, should be allowed to remain passive and inactive when a contractor having dealings with it accuses it of being a means of extorting and collecting graft? Is it reasonable to accept the theory that there is nothng for the Government to investigate simply because no member of the House of Commons desires to make the contractor's charges his own? The more independent of the newspapers supporting the Government have declared that the Government cannot afford to allow the matter to remain as it is. They are right. The Government declined the opportunity offered it by Dr. Daniel of cleaning its skirts. That, however, does not make it any the less desirable that they should be cleaned.
