McCready Vinegar Factory Burned--- Loss Will Easily Reach \$50,000 --- Three Alarms Before Daylight Caused Much Anxiety.

The McCready vinegar factory situated on Camden street, between Simonds and Portland street, was destroyed by fire early this morning and it is expected the loss will approximate at least \$50,000.

The fire was discovered about 2.30 by a person who saw smoke and flame issuing from the building. At once an alarm was sent in from box 142 and the North End fire companies rushed to the scene.

On the arrival of the firemen it was seen that the blaze was a serious one and assistance was sought from the companies in the central and south portions of the city.

How the fire caught is a mystery as yesterday, being a holiday, the plant was not working and as far as known there was no fire in the building last night.

The building which was of wood and three stories in height proved a ready prey to the flames and although the firemen worked with a will and had a good supply of water it was speedily apparent that the structure was doomed. As James T. McCready of the firm went to New York Wednesday evening it was

impossible to get any idea of the insurance this morning but it is believed that building, stock and plant were well covered. Part of the building was used as a bonded warehouse and in it was stored a large

quantity of alcohol used in the manufacturing process. Up to 3.30 the warehouse portion had not been burned but it was feared that it would go. The fire was a very spectacular one, the flames lighting up the sky to such an extent that the reflection was visible for miles. Despite the fact that it occurred at an hour
