

## UNITED FARMER DELEGATE SAYS ST. JOHN GREAT PLACE FOR CRIME

Farmers' Organization of New Brunswick Not Making Progress Promoters Had Hoped for—Behind in Salaries to Officers and Little Interest Being Shown in Its Future

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 22.—The *Standard* Quebec and in Montreal. She remarked that if reference to crime must be made, it would not be necessary to go back to the year 1860. She had the consciousness of work well done and pride in a happy home. She was not deprived of comforts, as so many imagined. She had piano, violins and the best class of literature, far different from the ditty stories to be found in the books.

On the recent general election had had a bad effect on the organization. A stronger spirit of class consciousness was needed. Too many farmers had returned to their old political party. The leadership, however, felt that all should stick together.

More money must be provided. Membership fees provided but \$2,454.00 and the system was unsatisfactory. During the convention a resolution to be forwarded to the Provincial Government would be passed, urging that the credit system be established in the past, too many such resolutions had been sent to the Government before it to be solved.

On the motion of Mr. Sharpe, a resolution condemning any move toward the introduction of a measure for the dealing with the liquor traffic on a revenue basis, was passed unanimously.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, of Fredericton, Field Secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, and Donald Fraser, of Plaster Rock, president of the same body, addressed the convention.

Mr. Wilson drew attention to the fact that in the Province of Quebec only three hundred municipalities out of three thousand had adopted the revenue producing liquor act. Mr. Fraser said that the devil was trying to ask the people if they would return for revenue.

Mr. Sharpe, of Grand Falls, caused a sensation when he took exception to remarks made relative to crime conditions in the province of Quebec.

## St. Andrew's Church Plans Forward Step

### First Step Toward Adequate Supervision of Boys' and Girls' Work Taken Last Night.

The nominating committee are: For boys' work, the presidents of the various women's and girls' organizations; for boys' work, the minister, Sunday school superintendent, chairman of trustees board, and supervisor of boys' work.
