

Naples, Feb. 16.—Folice and the thorities have deposited in the Bank of Italy the 160,000 gold rubles found on board the Italian steamer Ancona when it was searched here yesterday. GT. BRITAIN BREAKS ALL RECORDS FOR SHIP CONSTRUCTION IN 1920

London, Feb. 16 .- All records for the construction of merchant ves

London, Feb. 16.—All records for the construction of merchant vessels were broken by the yards of Great Britain during 1920, when 618 vessels, of 2,055,624 tons were completed. The total of 1919 was exceeded by 435,182 tons, and the previous record figures of 1913 by 142,371 tons, says Lloyd's Register of Shipbuilding.

On the other hand, the figures given for the 1920 output of United States yards—509 vessels of 2,476,253 tons—shows a decrease of 1,599,32 tons compared with 1919, this decrease accounting for over 92 per 132 tons compared with 1919, this decrease accounting for over 92 per 1919 of the total reduction in tonnage launched abroad during 1920. cent of the total reduction in tonnage launched abroad during 1920.

The report calls attention to the fact that in other countries a steady decrease took place during the whole of 1920 in the work in hand. At the beginning of the year the tonnage under construction amounted to 4,367,114 tons, and at the end of December the total was \$470.862 tons, or a decrease of 1,396,252, due to the enormous decrease in the shipbuilding industry in the United States. The world's output for 1920 was 1,759 vessels of 5,861,666 tons, against 2,483 vessels of 7,144,549 tons in 1919, and 1,750 vessels of 3,332,882 tons in 1913.

A feature of the year has been the launching of 1,825,000 tons of vessels to be fitted with steam turbines, these figures representing one-third of the total world's output of steel steam tonnage. 470,862 tons, or a decrease of 1,396,252, due to the enormous decrease in

The tonnage launched by Japan, Norway and Sweden during 1920 also shows a decrease, but the output of other countries increased
