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The Red Rovers, U.N.B.'s J.V. Girls Basketball team, won an impressive victory in the Intercollegiate Tournament held last weekend at the Mount Allison Athletic Centre.

The tournament consisted of two sections of three teams each. Section A included U.N.B., Dalhousie and King's. While Mount Allison, St. Thomas and Mt. St. Bernard competed for honours in Section B.

The action saw U.N.B. emerge as winners of Section A to compete against Mt. St. Bernard, winners of Section B, in the championship game. Paced by Langley with 18 points and Dennis with 12 points, U.N.B. won a decisive victory over the Mt. St. Bernard team by a score of 49-18.

U.N.B.'s most impressive performance came in their second game, against Dalhousie. Play was pretty even until the beginning of the fourth quarter when Langley and Schroeder scored 3 fast baskets which gave U.N.B. the necessary confident edge. The game ended with 48 fouls evenly distributed and with a score for U.N.B. of 30-19. Langley scored 18 points in this game. Schroeder counted.

Each member of U.N.B.'s team played remarkably well. Sharp shouting, fantastic guarding, good coaching and terrific team spirit all combined to enable U.N.B. to bring home the MWIAAU trophy for the third consecutive year.

U.N.B.'s team, coached by Mary-Lou Whitwill, consisted of Leekie Langley, Diane Schroeder, Joanne Geldart, Sheila Dennis, Kathie Kerrigan, Joyce West and Diane Kozak, Sheila Hult, Nancy Desormeau, Marilyn Thorpe, Roberta Reid and Pat Diek.

The first inter-faculty ski meet was held last Saturday at Crabbe Mountain, and while adverse weather conditions undoubtedly deterred many potential competitors, over thirty entries were registered.

The event consisted of a single run slalom course set by veteran racer and varsity ski team member, 'Rope' Webster. Webster was also responsible for co-ordinating and organizing the meet and was given invaluable assistance by team-mates Dave Olmstead, Wally Brown and Laird Brown. Heather Forbes and Art Moad were on hand to look after the recording, computing and timing of the race.

Ken Crompton's top time of 59.4 seconds was not quite enough to give the Foresters a first place, being edged by Peter Richardson and J. T. Thompson with respective times of 1:09.6 and 1:11.8. Richardson, a first year student, looked pretty good and could possibly win a berth on next year's Varsity team.

The meet, the first ever to be held, was an overwhelming success. A spokesman for the UNB Ski Club said following the race that in view of the tremendous response and interest shown, they are now going a head with plans to hold possibly two or three meets each year.

A trophy is to be obtained in the near future and will be presented to the faculty with the best combined results.
