Station gets nod

Mississauga radio station CJMR has received a "good stamp of approval" from the Canadian Radio Television & Telecommunications Commission (CRTC), says its manager.

The station, which broadcasts from dawn to dusk, was informed this week that its licence has been extended until 1985. Manager Michael Caine says that is the longest period of licensing granted by the federal communications commission.

"We must be doing something right," he said.

The CRTC decision did not include any criticisms of the station's performance over its last four-year licence period.

Mr. Caine says CJMR, which is located at 1190 on the dial, has some "exciting plans" for the future which it will be announcing later.

In its application, the station said it would continue to stress local news coverage and would continue its "adult contemporary and memory music" format.

Cinemas offer fare for art film fans

Central Parkway Cinemas rejected claims that art films have no audience in the suburbs and opened the four-theatre complex Boxing Day with the controversial movie *The Tin Drum*.

The *Tin Drum* won an Academy Award for best foreign language film but has been held up by the Ontario censor board because of what it calls sex scenes involving children. The edited version of *The Tin Drum* shown in Mississauga con-

stitutes a coup for Central Parkway Cinemas promoters.

"It's truly a feather in our cap," says promoter Michael Soroklit. "We are making no judgments. *The Tin Drum* is a classic and an award-winner which will be followed by Italian and Swedish art films. It all fits in with our balanced policy at the Central Parkway Cinemas."

The balanced policy at the \$1 million complex includes a variety of restricted, parental guidance and general audience films.

This week, the Central Parkway Cinemas offer *The Tin Drum*, *Apocalypse Now*, *Airplane*, and *Lovers and Liars*.

Saturday and Sunday matinees will be shown at 1:30 p.m. and the box of-

face opens weekdays at 6:30 p.m. Phone 276-8782 for movie times. Admission is \$4.50 for adults, \$3 for youths, and \$1.50 for children and senior citizens.

Mr. Soroklit says the 1,000 seat complex will be a "viable alternative" to Square One theatres because people are dissatisfied with long line-ups and little variety in films.

The Central Parkway Cinemas features Dolby stereo equipment and rocker chairs purchased from Florida to make the movie watcher "feel like he is in his own living room," says Mr. Soroklit.

The Central Parkway Cinemas are owned by Ontario Theatres, which manages 35 theatres in the province.
