"In all cases where it is deemed necessary by the Medical Health Officer of any municipality, owing to the presence, or threatened presence, of small-pox he may with the approval of the local Board of Health, require certificates of successful vaccination, or of insusceptibility on re-vaccination within seven years, of all students of high schools, collegisate institutes, colleges and universities within the munleges and universities within the mun-icipality, to be presented to the proper authorities of the said institutions; and no student refusing to present such certificate on demand shall be admitted to further attendance or classes in said institution until such certificate is furnished." R. S. O.,

1887, c. 206, s. 17.


