The Feast of Corpus Christi, celebrated on Sunday last, was marked in every city parish by all the solemnity and impressiveness of which it was capable. At the Cathedral a solemn High Mass was celebrated at 110.30, Rev. Father Rholeder, assisted by Rev. Fathers Morrow and O'-Malley as deacon and sub-deacon, was the celebrant. Rev. Father Whelan preached on the origin of the Feast when in 1246 the denial of the Real Presence, awakened a great outburst of faith and adoration and a special day upon which to honor our Lord an the Blessed Sacrament was instituted. Mass was followed by a proment in which the Sodality and Acolytes took part, the canopy being carried by gentlemen of the parish and Rev. Father O'Malley acting as cross-bearer. 
