## Halifax, 8th December, 1785:

## GENTLEMEN;

- I conceive it my Duty to give you every Information in my · Power, and am very forry it is at present on so disagreeable a subject; ' A Committee of the House have this Day set aside the Election ! eld e at Annapolis, so far as it related to Mr. Seabury, and a new writ for 6 the Election of a Member will be issued immediately. It is unnecesfary for me to observe the proceding was irregular and unprecedene ted, every Thing that could be faid in our favour was urged by the Attorney General Mr. Blowers, but realy the Majority of Members appeared to have come determined right or wrong to vacate the Election, and with every argument that could be offered to suspend ' their opinion until, the Sheriff was called upand heard in his Defence, the Measure was carried against us; Matters being thus circumstane ced it calls forth all your Exertions to support our Interest, and we fhall deserve our Fate if we permit Capt. Howe, to carry his Election; I hope and am positive your Zeal will animate you to step forward, and in Defiance of labour and trouble strain every Nerve to accomplish the returning of Mr. Seabury again. I am not frightned, at this Rebuff, but hope in the course of a few Days we shall carry a decided Majority in this House at least if I can judge from appearances, and I have the Vanity to think, that had the Question been oput off a few days we would not have met with this Mortification-· However let us not brood on the past but pash forward to the future. 6 Colonel Delancy must again revisit Digby, and every Man that has Interest there, Mr. St. Croix and the Mr. Ruggles's must attend to Wilmot and fend word to Col. and Lieutenant Robinson to have the Mountain people down. I wish I could be with you to partake of the Fatigue, but I must again call on you to strain every Nerve and . shew yourselves Men of Resolution.
- · What a Shame will it be to lose our Election, and how great a constraint Right will the Province at large have to ground their Opinion on, if Capt. Howe should be returned!
- 'Call a public and a general Meeting, and let your Measures be fpeedy and animated; any thing in my Power either in a Private or public Capacity, I beg you will command.
