PLANT SCHOOL BOARD.—A special meeting of the Board was convened on Tuesday evening, 9th inst. Present: W. Bradley, Chairman, W. G. Hay, J. E. Terhune, A. Little, and J. P. Newman. A report of the school was read by Mr. Clinie, which was ordered to be filed. It was moved by J. E. Terhune, seconded by A. Little, that Mrs. De Bell be appointed to be the school teacher at a salary of \$250; and that Miss De Bell be promoted to the 5th, and Miss Allard to the 6th Departments, at a salary of \$225; and that the Department receive the same salary they now receive for next year—carried. Moved by J. E. Terhune, seconded by A. Little, that Mr. Lowe, caretaker, be engaged for the year 1881, at a salary of \$250 per annum, to be entitled to same summer vacation as the teachers, except that during the vacation he is to keep a general supervision of the building and grounds and keep them in order—carried.

THE FIFTH.—On the 5th of November, 1880, the reign of James the 1st, an attempt was made by one Guy Powke to blow up the British Houses of Parliament. Although the King had believed with great tenacity in the Catholics in Scotland, those in England were so disappointed in their expectations, that the plot to wipe out at one blow the English Parliament, was concocted. Since that time the day has been celebrated more or less by the Orange societies. The celebration in Listowel consisted in a gathering of Orange Young Britons in the Osborne hall, on Friday evening. Besides a large turnout of the Listowel Y. B.'s, a number of Young Britons from Harrison and Brussels were present. The evening was spent in a very sociable manner with dancing and music. Refreshments were also provided. The gathering was highly successful, and everything passed off quietly.

SPECIAL SERVICES.—The special services conducted by the Rev. E. G. W. Hall in the M. E. Church are progressing with encouraging success. Services of Song are being held every evening at half past seven, followed by preaching. Children's meetings on Tuesday at 4 p. m. Ladies' conversational meeting on Wednesday afternoon, conducted by Mrs. Hall. These meetings are seasons of spiritual profit, and times of refreshing, when souls are born into the "Kingdom of God." Although the inclement weather tends to make pedestrianism disagreeable, yet mostly roads, dark nights and frequent showers are obstacles overcome. The faithful shall triumph. The interest is increasing; young men and women are rising up and saying, "Praise for us." The battle is raging; the hosts of darkness are crumbling. Christian warriors unite, for a victory shall be on Israel's side," and in the name of the living God we will go up and possess the heavenly land. Besiege the citadels of sin and win them for Jesus—Com.

DR. WILD'S LECTURE.—Owing to the disagreeable weather prevailing on Monday evening, Dr. Wild did not draw a full house as greeted him upon his former visit to Listowel. The audience, though not large, was an intellectual one, and did not doubt the distinguished lecturer appreciated this as highly as he could have done. A large and judicious audience. The lecturer's quantity in the Listowel Empire was the subject of the Dr.'s discourse. The lecturer was designed to trace a connection between the Lost Ten Tribes and the British nation. Dr. Wild is apparently convinced in his own mind of their identity, and brings a deal of argument to prove his conclusions. In the course of the lecture the lecturer reviewed the early history of the Israelites, describing the location of the twelve tribes in the land of Canaan, and the manner in which each tribe had adapted itself to the locality which had been prophetically assigned it. He drew attention to the prophecies recorded in the Scriptures concerning these tribes, concluding that no other people but the British nation had fulfilled and were destined to fulfill those prophecies. The "Catasys" quantity, the lecturer explained to be the mysterious influence, or "spirit," with which God had endowed his chosen people. This "Catasys" quantity was something beyond the range of science, the strength in Sampson's hair being instanced amongst others as an illustration of it. While doubts were not permitted to accept the lecturer's conclusions—as, for instance, the inhabitants of the north of Ireland being the descendants of the tribe of Ashur, or the descendants of the tribe of Manasseh being none other than John Bull and his numerous progeny—the audience could not be otherwise than deeply interested by Dr. Wild's forcible style and the originality of thought and manner surrounding the lecture. The Dr. was given a patient hearing, and at the conclusion of the lecture a vote of thanks was accorded him.

LISTOWEL HIGH SCHOOL.—The following report of the Listowel High School will be read with interest by the well wishers of that institution. It is gratifying to learn that the school, under the present management, is making excellent progress. Mr. McCallum, the Head Master, is evidently deeply interested in the success of the school, and is laboring zealously to advance the knowledge of the pupils. The rapidly increasing attendance has necessitated the employment of a third teacher, and the Board have wisely decided to throw no obstacle in the path which would affect the success of the school, and is very satisfactory condition. It is due to my pupils that I should inform you that no instance of disobedience or want of that proper decorum pertaining to the success of a school has been as yet manifested. Every rule and regulation are so faithfully observed that as yet I have not been called

upon to mete out any kind of punishment, which is as satisfactory to me as it must be to you and the people whom you represent. Allow me to sympathize with you in the loss which you sustained in the teaching staff through the death of my late assistant, Mr. Day. As Principal of the school, I considered you very fortunate in having secured the services of so painstaking and conscientious a teacher as my late friend proved himself during his short career; and I can assure you that his death is not lamented by any one who has known him. Notwithstanding this severe loss to which I am called upon to refer, I am delighted to state that taking everything into consideration the progress of the school in the various subjects taught has been, so far as I can judge, very satisfactory. The pupils exhibit a lively interest in the studies, which interest has proved itself genuine by the results of monthly examinations that I have established to awaken an ambitious sentiment amongst them. Here I might state that my policy is to see that the third and second forms will receive a thorough drilling in the English and Latin subjects, without neglecting the attention that must be given to a higher education. I also endeavor to bestow the attention on the higher forms which will, I trust, result in showing that they also receive justice at our hands. I have to confess that in such a large school as ours, it is to be, it is a very difficult matter for two teachers, having so many subjects to superintend, to give that time and attention which certain subjects demand; but at the same time this deficiency is to a certain extent removed by giving extra lessons before and after school hours. I have to report that the laboratory of the school is in a very defective state. In teaching such a science subject as chemistry the difficulty to pupils and teachers is materially increased by want of proper chemicals, and so far as this subject is concerned I would earnestly urge upon you to make an appropriation to meet the difficulty that I have to contend with in the science department.
