

GRAND VALLEY NOTICE

City Not Likely to Get Possession of Road Until July First

Mr. E. R. Stockdale, general manager of the Trust & Guarantee Company, Toronto, has written the Grand Valley bondholders in the city as follows: For the reason that it is not considered likely that the arrangements for the proposed sale to the City of Brantford will be completed before the first of June, we have been requested by the chairman of the bondholders committee to advise you that immediately upon the opening of the adjourned meeting of bondholders to be held at this office on Wednesday, May 13, at 12 o'clock noon, a motion will be made to adjourn the said meeting until Wednesday, the 17th day of June, 1914, to be held then at the hour of 12 o'clock noon. It will thus be seen from Mr. Stockdale's notice, that there is little likelihood of the city getting possession of the road until July 1, or may be later.
