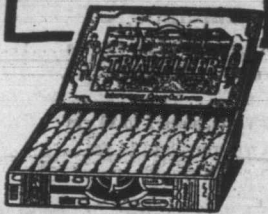

WILL YOU VOTE FOR SUCH AN INCOMPETENT GOVERNMENT.

Why should the people of Nova Scotia vote to retain in power the Murray-Daniels Government?
Should they vote for them because they have given away all the Crown lands of the Province?

Should they vote for them because they have put the most valuable coal mines into the hands of monopoly?
Should they vote for them because they have tied up millions of dollars worth of valuable coal seams with speculators and promoters who refuse to develop them?

Should they vote for them because they destroyed the gold mining industry of Nova Scotia?

Should they vote for them because they have allowed the rural population of the province to disband and emigrate because of the bad roads?

Should they vote for them because they have given all the valuable foreshores to speculators and thus debarred inhabitants of the sea shore from cultivating and fishing oysters and catching lobsters?

Should they vote for them because after 34 years of road administration and the expenditure of several million dollars the highways are in a worse condition than they were in 1892?

Should they vote for them because every year of their administration they have expended over \$530,000 more than the revenue of the province, which over expenditure is now added to the public debt of Nova Scotia.

Should they vote for them because they operate the public affairs of Nova Scotia in the interests of the few rather than for the benefit of the people as a whole?

Should they vote for them because their administration has given to their friends every natural resource and valuable privilege known to the government.

Should they vote for them because they have a road organization that employs a high priced commissioner, a high priced deputy well paid engineers, expensive inspectors, and a horde of 9,000 road masters and paymasters, all of whom must be fed out of the trough before one dollar can get to the roads?

Should they vote for them because in the 34 years of their administration they have evolved a road system conceived, not for the improvement and maintenance of the highways, but for the purpose of keeping the treasury of the Province in the hands of the present administration?

Should they vote for them because Premier Murray defied the courts and illegally paid \$48,500 to one of his political friends?

Should they vote for them because Attorney-General Daniels tried to get a slice of \$75,000 out of a public transaction involving the security held by the government as trustees for the people of the province?

Should they vote for them because Premier Murray claims in other countries than Halifax that he enacted prohibitory legislation and at the same time because he states that the liquor interests of Halifax that the prohibitory legislation was enacted by the opposition?

A DEGRADING AND INIQUITOUS PATRONAGE SYSTEM.

Wickwire as Crown Prosecutor Draws Heavily from the Government Funds

Why has the Murray-Daniels' government repeatedly resisted the efforts of Mr. C. E. Tanner, K.C., the Liberal-Conservative leader, to place an independence of parliament act on the statute books of this Province?

Why does Nova Scotia stand alone among all the provinces, in allowing members of the legislature to sell their goods and their services to the government control?

Why is it that the law of this province is so loose and accommodating, that members of both houses can accept appointment and positions of emolument under the government and continue to retain their seats?

How is it that last year thousands of dollars of public money were chequed out of treasury by the government to members of the assembly and of the council, in violation of the principles of the independence of parliament which are recognized and respected in every other part of his majesty's dominions?

How is it that Mr. Wickwire continues to draw many hundred dollars every year from the public funds as Crown Prosecutor in direct violation of the true independence of Parliament idea and yet shed hypocritical tears because A. deW. Foster allowed checks to pass through his hands in payment for horses which he was able to get the Government to purchase here so as to give our farmers some needed money to take the place of what they had failed to get from a poor crop.

The reason is, that the Murray-Daniels' patronage system so wills it.

It is the price the people of Nova Scotia are paying for leaving the "trusteeship" of the treasury in the hands of a third-of-a-century-old government.

It is because—as the Honorable George H. Murray once reminded the people, "Long holding of office has brought about

its inevitable consequences—jobbery and corruption in every branch of the public service!"

Dead Letter Law

In his manifesto, Premier Murray has much to say in respect to what his government has done for the workaday people.

He cites the factory act. But what are the facts about this piece of legislation?

It remained a dead letter on the statute book for three or four years until Mr. Tanner stirred the government up two or three times re the matter.

He also cites the workmen's compensation law. Another dead letter act.

During the season just closed Mr. Tanner and his followers urged him to put this act in force at once, but he refused to do so till 1917.

Why? He's afraid of the employers. —Citizen.

Drawing A Ring of Steel Around the Germans.

London, May 29—The British Belgian and Portuguese forces, who have invaded German East Africa, are slowly drawing a ring around the Germans, while General Smuts, the Boer commander of the South African forces, is rounding up the Germans who are defending the Usambar railway and has occupied Ipana, one of the important stations on that line, as well as other towns in the district, according to an official report issued today.

A British force under Gen. Northey has penetrated twenty miles into German territory on the front between Lakes Nyassa and Tanganyika.

The Germans have retired toward New Langenburg. The Belgians are advancing from the northeast, and Portuguese troops are occupying the southern frontier.
