IN THE FAR WEST.

Will Stevens and Arch. Campbell Are With a Surveying Party.

The Former Gives a Post Interesting Description of Their Trip From Toron o to Edmonton.

Will A. Stevens, son of N. H. Stevens, of this city, who has been in the mining school at Toronto for the last year, received a position along with Archie Campbell, son of A Campbell, M. P., with a surveying party under Mr. Duberger, and writes to his mother from Edmonton, Alberta, as folnother from Edn

Camp Eat-all, Edmonton, Alberta.

May 11th, 1900. Ma Chere Mere,-We arrived here to-day Ma Chere Mere,—We arrived here to day at 5 o'clock. Mr. Duberger, our chief, was at the station with a buckboard and broneo to meet us. He made us feel quite at home, and I feel quite flattered, sleeping in the same tent with him. There are eleven in the party, eight of whom are Frenchmen and can apeak but little Faglish. Mr. Duand can speak but little English. Mr. Du-berger, D. L. S., speaks both French and English. There are four tents, five wagons or carts, one buckboard and a saddle horse in our camp. Mr. Duberger asked us what we would like to do and gave us a hint that chaining was the easiest, so we said we would do chaining. We rre going to move camp to morrow afternoon if we can get away. Our permanent address is care of Mr. Duberger, D. L. Sr, Strathcona, Alberta berta.

I could not tell you much about our trip on the postal cards sent so will try and tell you more in this letter. We left Toronto Monday, the 7th inst, 2 p. m., and there was very little to be seen until we reached Allandale, a place near Barrie. There we had our first glimpse of the rocky wilds, nothing but rocks and small groves of pine and thing but rocks and small groves of pine and spruce timber until we passed North Bay we changed cars at North Bay, and we got in a colonist car which came through from Ottawa A lot of Galicians were in the car occupying every seat but one. This we took and I got up in the upper bunk to sleep, but one of these dirty fellows had his feet towards me and it was impossible to stay there, so I got back in the seat again with Archie Campbell and a fellow we fell in with on the way. Imagine three trying to sleep in one seat. But we managed to get about one hour's sleep. We found out at 4 o'clock a. m. that we could go in the next car, and that the Galicians could not come with us, so we quickly made our exit

into that car. 'The country from North Bay to Fort The country from North Bay to Fort William is very thickly wooded, interspersed with pretty little lakes and rivers. We watched for deer, but could see none. The only signs of habitation we saw was a camp of men cutting timber for ties. The most picturesque of that part of our ride was from Schrieber; to Port Arthur, the country is all rocks, and it would be impossible to farm it. The railway follows the north shore of Lake Superior very closely, sometimes the road perior very closely, sometimes the road would go so close to the lake that I became uncomfortable until we had passed over the most dangerous looking places. The engine never slackened speed for curves. We timed them for fourteen miles of the worst rest of the road and found that the part of the road, and found that the train was going at the rate of thirty-three miles per hour. This was very Buffalo, N. Y.

3IX TUNNELS on our way to Winnipeg. You may talk about your primitive people, but we saw a man thirty miles from Winnipeg plowing with a team of oxen, which was something new torus. which was something new torus.
Arrived at Winnipeg we called of
Mr. Isaac Campbell, who entertained Mr. Isaac Campberl, who entertained us at his club most royally, and gave us a little information about the country. We felt very thankful to Mr. Campbell for his kindness, and although we are quite a distance from home, Mr. Campbell made us so welcome, that we felt muite at home here. come that we felt quite at home here Game is very plentiful on the prairie, especially ducks. There were housands of them. We also saw a large flock of wild geese and a great many wild fowl and animals. The birds we saw were geese, ducks, prhirie chickens, jack-snipe, grouse and meadow larks, and the animals were intelopes, of which we saw twelve in one flock, saw one wolf, any amount of gophers, but no prairie dogs, as I said on my post card. What we thought were prairie dogs were gophers.
At Regina the Indian chiefs, all painted and feathered, stood at the station. They certainly did look like the warriors we have often seen in

In the western part of Assiniboia for miles the country is almost entirely devoted to sheep ranching. We saw flocks upon flocks of them. The Indians at Medicine Hat offered for sale some most beautiful buffalo horns, all fixed up for hanging hats

or coats on, the prices ranging from 50c. to \$2 a pair.

I said that Calgary was not very important, but that was before I took a look round. Going through the city I found it was quite a large place has four banks, a large post office besides numerous other large build-ings. Just outside Calgary is located P. Burns & Co's, large cold storage houses. A man told me

monton we could see the snow-cupper mountains of the Rockies, which seen but in reality were over fifty, and probably one hundred and fifty.

The settlers are pouring into this country fast, but there is lots of room here for any number, as we passe through hundreds of miles of uninhal ited land, which appeared to have a rich soil. At one place we saw a muchouse. It had a frame-work of poles and the rest was filled up with sod. The fare out here was \$41, in addition to our expenses on the train, and outfit, blankets, etc., about \$10, which
