TWO BY ACCLAMATION.

Conservatives and Liberals Get a Seat Each--Reformers Oppose John Charlton--Casey Bound to Run.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 1.—The nomination of candidates for the House of Commons took place throughout the Dominion yesterday, and in every constituency but two there will be contests a week hence.

In North Waterloo, Joseph E. Sedgman, the Liberal Conservative candidate, was elected by acclamation, while in Drummond and Arthurs, Quebec, a constituency which in the last general election gave a Liberal majority of 1,648, the Laurier candidate, Lavergne, is unopposed.

In South Lanark both candidates are Conservatives, and in South Huron, John McMillan is opposed by another Liberal.

West Elgin will have a three-cornered contest, Geo. E. Casey, ex-M. P., who was turned down by the Liberal convention, having decided to run as an independent Liberal. The four constituencies in which nominations will be held later, viz.:—Yale, Carleton Place, B. C., nominations Nov. 14, and polling Nov. 21; Huron, B. C., nomination Nov. 24, and polling Dec. 8; Guelph, O., nomination Nov. 5th, and polling on Nov. 14th, and Nipissing, where, owing to the absence of voters' lists, the election has been indefinitely postponed. In all of these constituencies the candidates will no doubt be the same as published heretofore.

LIBERALS OPPOSE CHARLTON.
At the North Norfolk nomination proceedings at Delhi, J. C. Ross, a straight Liberal candidate was nominated in opposition to John Charlton. At a public meeting held subsequently Mr. Ross said that, he appeared before the electorate as a supporter of the present administration, and if elected would do his utmost to promote the interests of Canada, and would jealously guard all matters pertaining to his own constituency. Mr. Charlton had been nominated at the annual meeting of the party in February last as a supporter of the government, but during the past few weeks, from causes which he had not explained, he issued an address voicing sentiments which were distasteful to Liberals. He had been urged by representative Liberals from all parts of the riding to accept the nomination. After considering the matter he had consented to carry the banner of Liberalism in the present contest, and from the assurance given him and the enthusiasm manifested since he had given his consent to run, he had every confidence in the result, as he was satisfied the electors of Norfolk had no use for an independent. Mr. Charlton spoke for half an hour on the

lines of his address published last week. He claimed to support the government in what he considered to be right, but would claim the privilege of being guided by his own judgment. He advocated an increase of duty as against the United States until they were forced to give us reciprocity of tariffs. The present prosperity of the country was due to the blessings of Providence, and to causes that were entirely beyond the control of the present government.

THE WEST ELGIN RIV.

A St. Thomas correspondent says: The struggle between the two factions of the Liberal party in West Elgin reached a culminating point at the nominations in Dutton when both Mr. McGugan and Mr. Casey entered the field and made their respective claims. Mr. McGugan, J. D. Shaw, J. C. Schierhapp, J. P. of West Lorne. All the candidates received a good reception. Hon. David Mills spoke in behalf of Mr. McGugan.

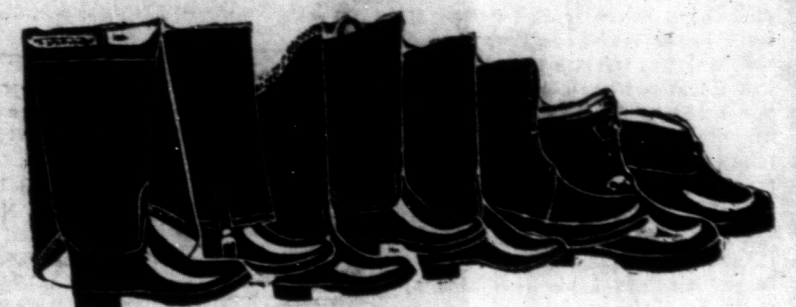
A Kingston despatch says:—A telegram from Cataragui saying the nomination of D. D. Rogers, Independent candidate in Frontenac, has been protested on the ground that his declaration papers were improperly witnessed. J. B. Waltem was protested on behalf of the Conservative candidate, H. A. Calvin. T. C. Stark, returning officer, has taken legal advice in the protest against the candidacy of D. D. Rogers, and is notified that he cannot interfere and declare Calvin elected, but that the election must proceed. Mr. Rogers' papers are declared not to be fully regular, but William Pillar, having taken the oath of forms that he saw the witnesses subscribe their names, makes the declarations sufficiently valid to warrant Mr. Rogers' candidature.

A SLANDER NAILED

President Walters, of the Sons of England,

Declares There is Nothing Antagonistic to Roman Catholics in Their Constitution or By-Laws.

To The Planet.—I have read a report of a meeting in Dover where Mr. Geo. Stephens, the Reform candidate, and one Mr. Mulvey, canvassed some of the French speaking electors against Mr. T. A. Smith on the ground that he was a member of the society known as the Sons of England. I am president of the Sons of England in the City of Chatham and I am prepared to show the constitution and by-laws of this society to anyone to prove the statement false as made by Mr. Stephens and Mr. Mulvey that the society is an organization opposed to the French or against Catholics. There is not one word in the constitution or by-laws against either race or creed and it is a society organized the same as any other fraternal and benevolent society and for those purposes only.

The means taken during this campaign by Mr. Geo. Stephens and his friends only show to what hard straits they are driven to smother up the issues on which the people of Kent county and the Dominion at large are pressing home to the party of broken promises, incapacity and corruption that have governed Canada for the last four years. The latter reason are sufficient for us to leave the Liberal party to which I always belonged but the cry now raised makes me ashamed that I ever did belong to the party.
