### A LARGE FUNERAL

The funeral of Mr. John Rice, postponed pending the arrival of his son, Mr. Frank D. J. Rice, of California, who desired to pay his last tribute to the memory of his departed father, occurred yesterday afternoon, under the auspices of the A. O. U. W., to Maple Leaf Cemetery. Mr. Rice was born on the old Gansgrave farm, adjacent to the city. He was one of quite a large, respected, and he bred family, all of whom have predeceased him Miss Sarah Rice, Capt. Philip Rice, now living in the old homestead, William, of this city, and Isaac, of New Zealand. One peculiar incident in his long and honorable career is that he died on the farm he was born on some 77 years ago. He was largely a self-made man, accumulating his large fortune, represented by over six figures, by dint of great energy, perseverance and enterprise. He was in this Western District knew and had dealings years ago with John Rice, merchant and far trader, King St., Chatham. He was familiar with the French language, and could talk the Indian language quite intelligently. His dealings were always fair and honorable, and to this may be attributed largely his great success, ranking as Chatham's most successful merchant in his day, and helping largely in various ways the building up of this city. He was active in politics, being a true believer in protective "Canada for the Canadians." The Park Street Methodist Church will remember him as a true and consistent member of its church. He was twice married. Both wives have predeceased him. He has two children living, Mrs. John W. Knight, of Detroit, Mich., and Mr. Franklin D. J. Rice, of Ocean Park, California. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Daniel. The pall bearers were Messrs. William Sloan, H. G. Reed, Sam Cowan, S. M. Smith, William Somerville, and Ed. Jordan.

### PARDON FOR ROWLEY.

Former Manager of Elgin Loan Co. Is Released.  
St. Thomas, Sept. 12.—George Rowley, the defaulting manager of the Elgin Loan Co., the collapse of which four years ago, ruined so many people here, who was sentenced to 12 years in Kingston Penitentiary by Judge Ermainger for forgery and theft, has been pardoned and is now out west.  
Rowley served exactly four years. His pardon was kept a complete secret.

Rowley's delinquency came to light at the time of the Atlas Loan smash. He was arrested and brought to trial on July 25, but at the request of the crown sentence was deferred three weeks to allow Rowley to assist the liquidators in investigating the books of the wrecked company. At the time of his sentence Rowley pleaded for leniency in order that he might endeavor to repay at least some of the money he had taken from those who trusted him.
