ORIGIN OF THE CHINA REBELLION.

The Rev. Mr. Tyson Yates, an American Baptist Missionary at Shanghai, has sent home the following account of what he believes to be the true origin of the present movement in China. We copy from the New York "Independent."

Shanghai, Sept. 22, 1853.
There are at present stopping in our mission two lads, whose identity is not known except to the natives. One of them is the son of the "Southern King" (one of the four great leaders of the rebellion in China). From these young men, the elder of whom is called Huan, we have learned that the origin of the rebellion was not, as is generally supposed, the result of a quarrel between the Christians and the pagans, but of a quarrel between the Christians and the Christians.

PERILOUS ADVENTURE IN A CAVE.

They entered the cave about eight o'clock on Tuesday evening, and had advanced a distance of nearly two miles when their lamp was unfortunately broken and extinguished.

IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.

An inventor has succeeded in extracting a thousand cubic quarts of hydrogen from twelve quarts of water. The hydrogen needs purifying, but the expense is little or nothing.
