### FRENCH TROOPS RAID AUSTRIAN POSITIONS

Rome, Sept. 9.—The official statement from Italian headquarters says: "South of the Asiago, French troops, after a short and violent artillery fire, yesterday morning raided enemy positions on Sissol, inflicting very heavy losses on the garrison and destroying the defence works. They returned with 47 prisoners."

"In the Concel and Astico valleys enemy patrols were driven back by our outposts. In the Frenzella valley our reconnoitering parties captured arms and material. In the Grappa region the enemy's assault detachments attempted three times to attack our lines on Salsola. They were repulsed and punished by our artillery fire."

"In Albania, on September 6, Italian naval machines and British airplanes carried out several bombardments, inflicting losses and damage on the enemy."

### U.S. Gets German Vessels

LIMA, Peru, Sept. 9.—An agreement was signed here today by representatives of Peru and the United States transferring to the American Government control of the German interned shipping in Peruvian waters. Six steamers and four sailing vessels, totalling more than 25,000 tons, are involved.

There is a big fruit crop in the Okanagan this year. More than 600 city girls helped to pick it. One rancher this summer made \$3,000 from two acres of cherries.

Vancouver bank clearings for the week ending August 29 show an increase of over 25 per cent against the figures for the corresponding period last year.

### SCIENCE DOES MUCH FOR INDUSTRY

In several British industries, native raw materials are now being utilized where, before the war, such materials were imported from the continent simply because the manufacturer did not happen to know that ample supplies of the same were at his very door, a fact of which he would have been informed had he consulted competent scientific authorities. This is well illustrated in the case of one of the largest steel corporations in England which, until 1914 had been importing from Austria, through a German firm, a certain material for lining its converters. When war was declared it congratulated itself on the fact that it had a two years' supply on hand. As time wore on, however, and the supply diminished, complicity gave place to anxiety. Finally the directors decided to call in scientific advice. They were referred to the geologists, who informed them that a bountiful supply of the material in question was available in the immediate vicinity of its own plant. The information was acted upon, a shaft was sunk at no great distance from their furnaces, and as a result, the company is now mining in sufficient quantity on its own account the material formerly imported from Austria at many times the present cost.

London, Sept. 7.—In Flanders British forces are pushing toward Messines, near the southern end of the Messines Ridge, and advanced their line last night a short distance in the direction of the town. Field Marshal Haig reported today.

North of La Bassée Canal British patrols made headway in the enemy positions in the vicinity of Cantelux and Violanes, according to the report, which says:

"North of the La Bassée Canal our patrols gained ground in the German positions about Cantelux carried out a successful minor operation yesterday evening between Hill 63 and Wulverghem as a result of which we captured fifty prisoners and advanced our line a short distance in the direction of Messines."
